MILK FAMINE HITS NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Only 25 to 35 per cent of the usual milk supply reached New York today, according to varying estimates from both sides of the big milk strike. Hospitals and the babies still had their share of fresh milk, but restaurants in many cases were without any, and householders found only small portions of their required amounts at their doors this morning.

Meantime, state authorities rushed work on an investigation of both the alleged distribution and producing combines now at loggerheads. A referee will take testimony in an effort to ascertain if the Dairy-men's league—the farmers' organization—is a combination in restraint of selling, and whether the Big Three distributors are guilty of any price-fixing conspiracy.

QUIET ALONG SOMME

LONDON, Oct. 3.—No fighting occurred on the British sector of the Somme front last night, Gen. Haig reported this afternoon. South of Loos the British made a successful raid on an enemy trench.
"One of the frequent notes we heard struck at the meetings held on the second anniversary of the war was to the effect that the INDIVIDUAL guilty must not be allowed to escape, and the malefactors responsible for the sinking of the Lusitania and the murders of Miss Cavell and Capt. Fryatt must be punished!"
As to who "the individual responsible" is, nobody in England has the least doubt. Englishmen speaking of it hardly ever consider it necessary even to mention his name. Frenchmen, however, speak openly of "the coming court-martial of the defendant, Hohenzollern."
The British government, thru Premier Asquith, has given two distinct pledges of uncompromising punishment, pledges that are aimed not only at the kaiser, but at the Hohenzollern dynasty, and all the directing officers of the German army.
On April 27, 1915, he declared "WITH ALL DELIBERATION" that the government would hold it its duty to exact reparation against "the guilty agents and actors in the matter," and July 31 last, following the murder of Capt. Fryatt, he emphatically reiterated the intention of the government to bring to justice the criminals, "WHOEVER" they might be, and "WHATSOEVER" might be their positions!

The allies mean by this none other than Emperor William himself, and do not consider in the least a joke the fact that the kaiser was found guilty of murder by the jury of Kinsale after the Lusitania horror. Nearly a hundred noted French and English leaders of opinion, including the dean of the Paris faculty of letters, the dean of the law school, Alfred Capus of the French academy, Andre Tardieu, a member of the chamber of deputies, and others have recently signed a petition to the entente governments asking an immediate declaration that the "authors, instigators and accomplices of the crimes charged against Germany, including the highest authorities," will be punished after the war.
French legal experts declare that by Germany's own acts she recognizes the right of a nation to try a criminal AT THE SPOT WHERE THE CRIME WAS COMMITTED, regardless of the nationality of the criminal. This recognized doctrine, they assert, will make the solemn trial of Emperor William by military or civil tribunals at Lille, and in Belgium and in England and Serbia, binding under international law, whatever may be the sentence!

WILL THAT SENTENCE—DEPENDING, OF COURSE, UPON THE ALLIES BEING VICTORIOUS—CONSIST IN BANISHMENT FOR LIFE TO ST. HELENA? EVERY WORD SPOKEN BY THOSE IN A POSITION TO KNOW INDICATES THAT BANISHMENT OF THE HOHENZOLLERN WOULD BE THE PUNISHMENT. IN THAT CASE, ST. HELENA WOULD BE THE LOGICAL PLACE. BUT CAN THE ALLIES CATCH THE KAISER—EVEN IF HIS ARMIES SHOULD BE COMPLETELY DEFEATED?
To this volcanic island of 47 square miles, Great Britain has sent many of her prisoners of war, including Gen. Cromle and other Boers. But, of course, the case of Napoleon is the great precedent to which the allies point for parallel.
The Germans are known to have several trump cards that they would surely play to euvre such an outcome! The only reason Napoleon did not flee to America was that there was no way of making his escape. Emperor William, it is known, would choose the United States as his foster land, in the event of the great disaster to his armies which no German now admits is possible. For the United States is the only great power that has not turned against him. Even Brazil, supposedly the center of a powerful German colony, has voted its open sympathy with the allies.
And for Emperor William there would be a definite avenue of escape to America. How?
Well, I was seriously told in London that the recent trip of the submarine trader Deutschland to Baltimore was really only AN EXPERIMENTAL VOYAGE—with a distant purpose in mind, connected with William II. of Germany! In the last days of the war, some Londoners firmly believe, there will be a special express train up in Berlin, ready, in the event of final defeat, to take a cleared track to Wilhelmshaven!
And—say these prophets—the kaiser would be safely brought to Baltimore under the Atlantic ocean by Capt. Koenig of the Deutschland!

\$75,000 ADDED TO CITY BUDGET

Three items, which will mean an expenditure of \$75,000, were reinstated in the 1917 city budget at the public hearing Monday.
They had been cut out at the conference between Mayor Gill and the council Friday.
The items reconsidered and inserted were the \$30,000 fireboat for Salmon bay, the \$42,000 bridge over the West waterway, and a \$3,200 testing machine for the engineering department.
As the budget now stands, \$4,274,695.27 must be raised by taxation. The vote for the fireboat stood 5 to 4, with Councilmen Fitzgerald, Haas, Bolton, Hesketh and Erickson voting aye.
Thomson was the only one to vote against the bridge item.
Dale and Moore voted against inserting the testing machine item.
Moore voted against accepting the finance committee's report on other items stricken Friday.
Thomson as County Auditor Thatcher forwards a certificate of assessed valuation of the city, the ordinance fixing the mill levy will be prepared.
Councilman Hanna voted against the billboard bill that bears his name, but which was revised, eliminating the square foot tax, when it was finally passed at Monday's council meeting.
"It was so radically amended that I could hardly recognize it," he said.

The raid by State's Attorney Hoyle, of the Sportsmen's Club of America, of which Mayor Thompson formerly was president, is causing the panic among local politicians and saloonkeepers who are said to have bought promises of immunity thru purchase of costly memberships in the club.
A grand jury will begin an inquiry into the affairs of the club to determine what has become of the \$100,000 to \$140,000 collected by the club for memberships.
Mayor Thompson, in commenting on the raid of the club, said: "So far as the Sportsmen's club is concerned, I regret very much that there is any trouble there, but if the club or any member of it has been guilty of using illegal methods or misrepresentations or promising to 'square' any law violator with the mayor of Chicago, then I am for a full and clean-cut prosecution."
The club supported me in election and did good work, for which I was, and am, grateful, but the mayor's influence is not to be sold or purchased."

HUNGER DRIVES HIM TO ROB GROCER

"I am hungry and want some money," announced a red-headed bandit as he shoved a gun in the face of Grocer H. Abrashin, who was counting the change at 1201 Madison st. at 9 p. m. Monday.
The grocer dished up \$7 in small coins, handed it over, and the hold-up man ran out without a word.
PARIS, Oct. 3.—A German attempt against French positions east of Comblès was quickly repulsed by the French last night. It was officially announced today. Elsewhere, with the exception of a rather violent artillery duel in the region of Rancourt, the night passed quietly on the Somme front.

AVIATOR DRIFTS AT SEA WHOLE NIGHT

BOSTON, Oct. 3.—After drifting all night in his hydro-aeroplane off Nantasket, where he had been forced to descend thru lack of gasoline, Lawrence Sperry, aviator and inventor, was picked up today.
Sperry was none the worse for his night on the water. He was not accompanied by Capt. Leo Dewey, as had been at first reported.
PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 3.—In spite of the hurry-up action taken by State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker in ordering the Chinese pheasant season closed October 15, two weeks earlier than usual, it is feared today that 75 per cent of the birds will be killed before that date. The number of pheasants in the state now is less than 40 per cent of the number a year ago, it is estimated.

\$250,000 FIRE LOSS

OMAHA, Oct. 3.—Officials of Morris & Co. this morning estimated their loss in the fire which last night destroyed the pork packing establishment of their plant in South Omaha at more than \$250,000.
Assistant Fire Chief Dineen and five firemen were seriously burned about the face and hands.
PARIS, Oct. 3.—Continuing their advance northeast of Florida, the Serbs yesterday captured first-line trenches on the heights of Stakowrag. It was announced today.
The Bulgars twice counterattacked against the positions won by the British on the east bank of the Struma, but were repulsed, suffering heavy losses.

GILL TALKS TO 1,000

A crowd of 1,000 heard Mayor Gill at Fire hall, Renton, Monday night when he opened a 2-cent meter attack on Initiative Bills 18 and 24, the hotel and brewery measures coming up for a vote November 7.
Gill denounced them both as a "backward step, which would seriously interfere with the enforcement of the dry law."
PETROGRAD, Oct. 3.—Massing considerable reserves, the Teutons hurled large forces against the Rus slans along the River Cenuyka and the heights on the right bank of the Snota Lipa, but were beaten back with heavy losses. It was officially announced today. In this region alone the Slavs have taken 5,000 prisoners in the last three days.
CHAMBER OF Commerce members and representatives of the Lake Washington Canal association discussed the possibility Monday of constructing a temporary bridge at Latona in place of the bridge which has been abandoned by the contractors.
