

WHY IS LUNDIN SILENT?

The Prosecuting Attorney, if alive to the people's interests, would have advanced information concerning the outrageous law violations, but Mr. Lundin merely appears overjoyed at the exposures made in the press of October 10th and 11th. Out of 42 Superior Court cases since January 1st, nine were acquitted as not guilty (that should never have been brought); nine pleaded guilty; three were convicted; one paid a fine of \$50.00, and 21 remain untried, until just before election. Then, because of their inactivity, two or three men were singled out and tried in order to attract attention and gain votes of the people. Is this sincere?

The records show that six cases were stricken from the trial calendar, and in one case, while three separate informations were filed, demurrers were sustained to two of them, when the case was stricken. This record shows incompetence and insincerity in the Prosecuting Attorney's office, and this record cannot be disputed.

Mr. Lundin holds office today under the Bull Moose Party and is running for office upon the Republican Party ticket.

May I not, with good taste and candor, ask for the support of sincere Republicans upon promise that if elected I will organize the office as nonpartisan, so as to make it correspond with our nonpartisan judiciary, with upright, mature lawyers, with the sole aim of giving efficiency, with economy? I will take the office of Prosecuting Attorney out of politics.

BROKER OFFERING REWARD IN WIFE'S MURDER IS HELD FOR IT

MOUNTAINVIEW, N. H., Oct. 13.—That Mrs. Florence Arlene Small, who was locked in her summer cottage and burned, lived in fear of her husband, Frederick L. Small, former Boston broker, charged with the murder, is the statement county officials say was made by Mrs. Elizabeth Curry, mother of the victim.

Mrs. Curry, according to authorities, depicts Small as a fear-inspiring hypnotist; a man without a drop of "the milk of human kindness" in his heart. County officers say they believe Small offered a reward of \$1,000 for the capture of Mrs. Small's murderer as a blind, and that sending a wreath of flowers with "To My Love" worked in white, to be placed on his wife's grave, was a play for sympathy.

Small stoutly maintains his innocence. In March, 1915, Small and his wife took out a joint insurance policy for \$20,000. In the event of Mrs. Small's death Small would become the beneficiary in the sum of \$20,000. If Small died first the money would have gone to Mrs. Small.

Several years ago Small, after divorcing his second wife, sued Arthur H. Soden, former president of the Boston National baseball club, for \$500,000, charging alienation of her affections. He was awarded \$10,000.

Attorneys for Small expect to clear him by showing that the doors of the cottage were locked on the inside. A key was found on the inside of the charred front door.
