BREWSTER, Oct. 20.—While Mrs. Edward Moss was attempting to hitch a team, one horse became frightened and started to run, throwing Mrs. Moss in such a manner as to break her ankle. She managed to creep to the house, where she remained without assistance or medical aid for two days.

On the second day she crept to the roadside, a quarter of a mile away, and waited for some one to pass.

In the course of an hour or so, a boy was hailed, who helped her back into the house, called her physician and telephoned her husband, who was working in Pateros.

CLAIM ALLIES KILL OWN COUNTRYMEN

BERLIN, Oct. 20.—Thirteen men, seven women and 13 children were killed in the month of September in French and Belgian territory occupied by the Germans, as a result of artillery or aerial fire of the entente allies, says the Overseas News agency. The number of civilian victims of their own countrymen since September, 1915, the news agency adds, has thus risen to 2,115.

U. S. SPENDS \$15,000 TO GET \$7,000

SALT LAKE, Utah, Oct. 20.—The United States government spent \$15,000 in convicting Utah master plumbers of violating the Sherman anti-trust law. It will get back in fines about \$7,000. A total of \$6,500 in fines was assessed against the convicted master plumbers by Judge Tillman D. Johnson, of the United States district court.

POLICE BREAK UP GANG OF BOY BURGLARS

STREUBENVILLE, O., Oct. 20.—With the arrest of three boys, police believe they have broken up a band of juvenile burglars whose operations in the last few months have extended from breaking into school-houses to opening office safes.

Two of the boys were caught as they came from a hardware store, where they tried to open the safe with a chisel and hammer.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 20.—John Kearns' wife is talking again. The Kearns spent one Sunday at the Botanical Gardens. A gardener explained to them the mysteries of dumbcane, a plant which, if touched to the tongue, renders a person speechless.

Later, when they had moved on, John said:

"Open your mouth, dear, and close your eyes. I've something for you."

He had. It was the dumbcane, and Mrs. Kearns was rushed to the hospital, where she recovered the use of her tongue after several hours.

APPLETON, Wis., Oct. 20.—One of the most unusual occurrences in the history of the marriage license bureau of the city was the application of two pairs of twins for licenses.

TOMBSTONE SAVES HIM FROM THE FLOOD

VICTORIA, Tex., Oct. 20.—H. J. Mench, the only resident of old Indianola, which formerly was one of the most important ports along the Texas coast, and was abandoned after the storm of 1886, had a narrow escape from drowning in a recent storm.

The high tide caused the waters to inundate most of the site of the old town and to surround Mr. Mench's home. He saved himself by floating on a ladder for a distance of about two miles to a place of safety in the Indianola cemetery. He spent the night there, crouched behind a tombstone, to protect himself from the wind.


MOTHER LOVE CAUSES DEATH OF CHILD
