JUDGE RONALD CUTS DOWN GERALD FINE

Clarence Gerald, proprietor of a cafe at 824 First ave., pleaded guilty, Wednesday, to violation of the dry law before Superior Judge Ronald, and was fined \$100 and costs.

Gerald's case came up from the justice courts on an appeal, after he had been fined \$250 and sentenced to 90 days in the county jail by a jury in Justice Brinker's court for keeping liquor with the intent to sell.

During a dry squad raid, on June 20, his place was destroyed. Prosecutor Lundin was indignant over the sentence, asserting that it was a fine means of encouraging bootlegging.

"Why, it is cheaper to get fined than take out a license," he said. Judge Ronald said that he was lenient with Gerald because it was his first conviction.

SEN. ROBINSON MAKES HIT HERE

"The man who has written the Golden Rule into our international law."

So Senator Helen Ring Robinson of Colorado described President Wilson in a speech at the Metropolitan theatre, filled mostly by women. The enthusiasm of the meeting was not exceeded throughout the campaign.

Mrs. Robinson has a decided vein of humor. Buffering from a slight cold, she apologized to the audience, saying she had attended a Hughes meeting recently and forgot to wear her fur.

Senator Robinson dwelt on the humanitarian legislation passed under the direction of President Wilson—the child labor law and the eight-hour law, particularly. As regards suffrage, she declared that the republican administration never even permitted the amendment to come to a vote in congress, while the democrats voted three times on it, each time bringing it nearer victory.

Dramatically she called on a "big, husky man" to get up and beat up a little boy near by.

"What! You won't do it to please a lady?" she asked.

"Hub! You must be too proud to fight him."

The audience roared.

"Fighting is dirty work," she said. "I know. I've been over where the war is making a desert of civilization. I don't blush for our conduct in keeping at peace with Europe, and with Mexico, too. I can buy 40 bushes more sincere in any drug store in this city."
