## HYPHEN ISSUE PREDOMINATES IN BOTH CAMPS

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—While political candidates today prepared for the beginning of the end, hyphenism still played the foremost role in the campaign drama. Candidate Hughes' declaration last night in Queens that he did not want the votes of any one "whose allegiance to our flag is not single and complete" was generally interpreted as an answer to democratic charges that he had dealt secretly with hyphen leaders. Hughes is booked for a Brooklyn speech tonight and may let forth another anti-hyphen blast. Then tomorrow he starts a New England, New York, Ohio and Indiana swing.

President Wilson is journeying westward for a Cincinnati address. Meantime headquarters here are bandying back and forth their charges of hyphenism against the enemy camp. Democratic circles rejoiced over Henry Ford's agreement to start a national newspaper advertising campaign for Wilson, especially in New York. Democratic leaders saw hope of winning women's votes in Ford's announcement that he had put his women workers on the \$5-a-day minimum wage after "inspiring" talks with President Wilson.

In the hyphen controversy, the republican camp had come forth with a statement charging that ex-Gov. Martin Glynn, of New York, bought Jeremiah O'Leary, American Independence Conference leader, not to be anti-democratic until after Glynn had seen Wilson. Moreover, the republicans claimed Glynn had sought to arrange a meeting between O'Leary and McCormick of the democratic committee. Glynn denied mentioning Wilson to O'Leary.

The democrats issued a new installment of its expose of alleged dealings between Hughes and the conference, claiming the conference sought to dominate not only this election, but also to have a permanent influence in American politics directed against Anglo-Saxon domination.

## N. H. KULIES OPENS CAMPAIGN FIGHT

H. H. Kulies, candidate for county treasurer on the democratic ticket, in a statement Wednesday, declared: "My nomination for county treasurer on the democratic ticket came to me without solicitation. I was East during most of the month of September, and was unable to take part in the primary election, and on the 17th day of October was notified that I had been nominated for the above office."

## CHEERING FOR WILSON GREETED T. R. IN DENVER

Denver, Oct. 25.—Col. Roosevelt started the last leg of his Hughes campaign tour today, with one more scheduled speech on his program—an address for Chicago—that he has labeled his "100-Per-Cent Americanism" message.

The colonel left Denver at 9 a. m. over the Union Pacific with auto horns honking and Denver's whistles tied down. Roosevelt addressed an audience of 9,000 in the afternoon and 14,000 in the evening at the Auditorium here yesterday.

He enjoyed the heckling which greeted him at the start of his speech last night.

Shows Mexican Pictures  
Roosevelt interpolated much into the speech not prepared in advance. When he turned on the Mexican issue he drew from his pocket a score of pictures which a friend had given him yesterday. They were pictures of ravaged towns; one was the picture of several hundred bodies of Mexicans piled in a heap.

"I wish I could show these pictures to you all," he said. "But they are too horrible. They show the kind of peace that is now raging as furiously as ever in Mexico, while our government in Washington prattles on about self-government, and likens the banditry of Mexico to our own great revolution which gave us liberty."

Murrah for Wilson  
"Hurrah for Wilson, any way," shouted several.

"Yes, go on with your hurrahs," said the colonel, leaning far out over the railing. "Don't stop until you hurrah for Carranza and hurrah for our murdered citizens on the border, and hurrah for the Americans murdered on the Lusi-tania, on which 103 babies under 2 years of age were drowned."

When he reached that portion of his prepared speech in which he declared "the great war was brought to our doors when the German submarine suddenly appeared at Newport," a clarion-voiced citizen got a laugh from the crowd when he belted "SOME Germans."

## RUMANIANS RUN FOR THE DANUBE

BERLIN, Oct. 25.—The Rumanian forces that evacuated Constantza have retreated nearly 20 miles, and are falling back steadily toward the Danube.

Official dispatches indicate that the Rumanians are forming their lines in a semi-circle, the ends resting on the Danube, for a stubborn defense of the Cernavoda bridgehead. The whole Black sea front north of Constantza is being evacuated by the enemy.

Interest is divided here between the Rumanian victory in Dobruja and Falkenhayn's new success in the invasion of Rumania from the west.

## SLAV LOSSES ARE ENORMOUS, REPORT

BERLIN, (Via Wireless to Sayville, L. I.), Oct. 25.—The Russians have lost 1,725,522 men in killed, wounded and captured since the Gallacian offensive began June 1, the semi official news agency declared today, quoting the Kiev central identifying office as authority.

Among these were 85,981 officers. Two generals, six colonels of brigades, eight colonels and lieutenant colonels and regimental commanders are among the Russian officers recently killed.

The greatest number of casualties were among the Siberian forces.
