CERTAINLY I shall vote for Initiative Measure No. 24, the Home Consumers' and Manufacturers' Act. One has only to observe how quickly the brewers from this state established themselves in California in order to maintain their export trade to know what Washington lost when the big brewing industry here was wrecked. The concerns, employing thousands of people, and representing millions of investment, did not rush to California because there were not already enough breweries in that state to supply the population there. They hastened to establish plants in that state because their brands of beer were known and had ready sale in the markets of Alaska, the Orient and South America, as well as in many parts of the United States.

Steamship trade between San Francisco and Alaska was promptly established, with beer exports as the mainstay of the trade. All of this was a net loss to this state, especially to Seattle. Our manufacturing industry here cannot stand at a loss to this character. Neither can our shipping industry.

Without regard to the question of personal liberty, business intelligence alone should convince any citizen that the brewing industry, with its enormous export feature, should be re-established in Washington, and re-established at once.

### ASK U. S. FOR RECEIVER FOR RENTON LINE

Legal storms still threaten the course of the Seattle & Rainier Valley Railway Company, following the filing of an application Wednesday with Judge Cushman of the federal court for the appointment of a receiver for the line.

The road has been in the hands of one receiver and then another almost continuously since 1894. Last June the line was sold by order of Judge Frater, and the bondholders took it over.

Conferences have been held with the city council and a number of new plans decided upon which, it was believed, might deliver the company finances out of the wilderness.

The plaintiffs in the new application have filed a 100-page complaint, and allege that the purchase was technically void. They are J. W. Wall and G. A. C. Rochester, who hold unpaid claims against the company, and W. F. Hickell, an old stockholder.

### SUB NEAR BUT DIDN'T OFFER AID TO MARINA

LONDON, Nov. 2.—The submarine that sank the British S. S. Marina, with the probable loss of six American lives, followed the ship boats for half an hour after the Marina went down, but offered no aid, American survivors reported.

A. Devlin, of Norfolk, and P. S. Hamlin, of Baltimore, among the Americans landed at Dublin, told practically the same story. The submarine was submerged when she fired the first torpedo, they said, but came to the surface, and, after seeing that the steamer remained afloat, shot another torpedo into it.

Dispatches from Queenstown say the missing members of the Marina's crew have been given up as lost. Practically all patrol boats that might have picked them up have been reported.


