## ALL BOXERS HARD AT IT FOR BATTLES

Matchmaker Joe Walsh, of the Metropolitan Lumbermen's club, has completed his boxing card of all-star events to be run off tomorrow night in Dreamland. Headed by a four-round tangle between Willie Hoppe and Lloyd Madden, for the Northwest lightweight championship, the bill shapes up as one of the best of a mighty good string of shows that have been pulled off in Dreamland the last couple of months.

While there is considerable talk about the Hoppe-Madden match, due to these two boys' wonderful showing in their last two scraps—Hoppe's draw with Ingle, and Madden's win over Harry Anderson—fans who anticipate some classy mitt slinging should not overlook the Jack Read-Harry Anderson fracas that is scheduled to do the semi-impudic act on the same bill.

### READ WORKING HARD FOR BOUT WITH ANDERSON

"On my first appearance in Seattle I will decide whether or not I am going to get a good start on my third trip to America," said Jack Read, who takes on Harry Anderson. As a consequence, Read is working hard for his meele and reported himself in good shape yesterday.

Willie Hoppe no doubt has the largest following in Seattle of any boxer who has stayed here any length of time, with but one exception, "Muff" Bronson.

Both Hoppe and Bronson made immediate hits with their style of gladiating on their first appearances in Seattle. Hoppe is a slugging go-get-er. He is on top of his man every minute of the meele and never takes a backward step. Bronson is clever and shifty and carries a k. o. punch in either hand. "Muff" and "Judge" Flannigan, his eccentric manager, are back in Seattle, so the Portland schoolboy will be seen in action again as soon as a cut over his eye heals.

### STANLEY JONES HAS MET SOME GOOD FIGHTERS

Stanley Jones, the San Francisco middleweight, who came here as Willie Ritchie's sparring partner, has met some mighty good boys in the California four-round game. ## WASHINGTON SQUAD TO BRING STORMY SEASON TO A CLOSE AT LAST

When the Washington eleven leaves the field, after the California game today, one of the most disastrous seasons, from the point of losing players, in the history of the local school will come to a close.

From the beginning of the season, Doble has lost some of his best men.

Bud Young, who was counted upon to be one of Washington's star players this season, left school and went to Chicago to work. MacKechnie, one of the hardest-hitting backs who ever wore the Washington colors, was another player who quit practicing on University field every night.

In the Whitman game, Doble lost two star backfield men in Anderson and Gardner. Then George Smith, regarded as All-Northwest end, had a muscle bruise on his right leg and quit under the doctor's orders. Not to be outdone by the rest of the Washington players, "Big Bill" Grimm had to be disqualified by

the faculty. Doble has every reason for complaint when he loses six stars in a single season, as he has this year.

One of the things that will make a hit with the football fans is the system of announcing that Manager Younger has installed for the game between California and Washington. Instead of having two announcers from the sidelines, as in former games, Younger has arranged for four, with Ned Edris, who was the freshman trainer, in charge. Two of these will be stationed on the north and south sides of the field.

Instead of having the old scoreboard, which told how the score stood, there will be one invented by Roy Taylor, which will tell how the score stands at all points of the game, the yardage gained, and the time left to play. The head linesman also will have a stick showing the number of downs left.

Returns from the Eastern games will be announced as they come over the wire.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—Jerked from his pedestal three days before he usually buys his ticket for the skids, King Football will pass out for 1916 early today. Officiating at the demise will be several prominent hussies, among them Brown and Colgate universities, two Eastern upstarts: Pittsburg and Penn State, and Rutgers and Washington and Jefferson.

Ordinarily football survives until the Saturday following Thanksgiving day, but this year the Army and Navy, departing from time-honored custom, decided to get to the people before the suffering public was weighted down with Thanksgiving dinners and such, and closed up shop last Saturday.

So the East will have today the

aforementioned Brown vs. Colgate affair, at Providence, the most prominent entertainment of the day. A warm rain was falling throughout the East, and sloppy fields were promised.

Colgate has visions of championship claims as she enters the contest. Since Brown took the measure of both Yale and Harvard, and since Yale beat Colgate, there is little chance for the New Yorkers to receive much of a rating unless they do hammer a victory out of Pollard et al. Colgate figures that if it is able to put a knot in the Brunonian standard, it will be able to lay claim to the championship.

At that, Pittsburg has something to say, and unless Penn State manages to take a fall out of Glenn Warner's gang at Pittsburg today, the Colgate claim would be rather empty.

Sibley parlors. Sudden death in the Jordan family was the cause of the postponement. Exhibitions were filled in.



It was the only touchdown of the game, and the first time Yale crossed Harvard's goal line since 1907. This touchdown made possible Yale's first victory over Harvard since 1909, when the Ellis won on field goals. In a wonderful last-ditch stand on the two-yard line, Harvard held three terrific plunges, then Neville, Yale's halfback, forced his way across the line. The picture shows the teams piled up in the great play that decided the game. The picture also shows a part of the wonderful crowd of 80,000 persons who packed the monster Yale bowl, which entirely surrounds the playing field.
