

**More Fords Than
Tax Lists Show;
Here's the Reason**

The Washington Automobile
Chamber of Commerce explains
why there are more machines in
the state than are listed in the per-
sonal tax statements.

It's like this.
A Ford costs \$415.
The depreciation of a Ford in
three months decreases the value
to \$325.
Personal property tax is based
on one-half of the assessed value.
This would place a Ford at \$162.50.
A married man, under the personal
property statute, is exempt from
taxation up to \$500.

SIGHT OF FOUR BLIND CHILDREN**


Last year the state board of con-



Many movements have been in-
augurated by well meaning peo-
ple; anti-saloon leagues, welfare
communities, Samaritan societies,
fellowships, prisoners' aids and
the like; all are doing their most
excellent work as far as possible
for them to do; yet the results are
not as satisfactory.

The one great factor in the im-
provement and uplift of humanity
and human conditions appears to
be overlooked by most people, and
that is **INDIVIDUAL EFFORT**, or
the reclamation of the **INDIVIDU-
AL FIRST** leaving the general re-
sult to follow as a natural se-
quence. Not that we should under-
estimate collective endeavor or al-
low it to cease, but that we, as
individuals, should, as a sacred duty,
devote every possible effort to the
enlightenment of men, women, boys
and girls; laying before them the
absolute necessity for personal
purity of thought, speech and ac-
tion, laying special stress upon the
need of so ordering their lives that
no boy or girl, no young man or
woman, would ever be guilty of any
word, thought or act which they
would be ashamed to repeat in the
presence of mother.

In brief, we should cease ham-
mering systems and customs and
begin earnestly to individualize ef-
forts. Clean up the man or the
woman, and public cleanliness will
naturally ensue; cure the drunkard,
and the distillery will cease to ex-

sense of justice, harmony and
