NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—The cudgel against “mushing” was taken up with a vengeance here today by Secretary Charles W. Dietrich of the Central Y. M. C. A. He defined the term as “that hugging, kissing habit” of young men and women at parties these days.

“It’s very bad from every standpoint, this dark and dangerous ‘mush’ party,” said Dietrich. “Yet is it a great habit among young folks today.”

“If you ‘mush’ too much now you will get tired of it before you ought to. They didn’t have anything of that sort when I was young, and I know of it now only thru my sons, who, by the way, have only heard of the ‘mush’ parties; they don’t attend them.”

Jake, J. M. Sickler and Frank Farnham stood talking. “Nelson” walked slowly by.

Suddenly a cloud passed over the moon and a beam of its light struck him full in the face. He turned his head, whipped out a knife, and attacked Judge Westlake. Sickler sprang between the two and was stabbed in the heart. The other two men were wounded.

SAXONIA CAPTAIN AND CREW RELEASED

On orders from Washington, immigration officials here have released Capt. Frank Heifer of the interned Hamburg-American freighter Saxonia, Capt. Johannes Wohlers of the sailing vessel Steinbek, and the 12 crew members arrested Monday after they wrecked the Saxonia’s engines.

All but one sailor returned to their ships at Eagle harbor. Customs officers will remain on guard there, however.

Lorenzo Dow, the one seaman who did not return, had declared his intention of becoming a citizen of the United States prior to his signing up with the Saxonia.

The men were arrested on the technical charge of entering the United States without permission.

WILL PUT 10 SHIPS ON THE ALASKA RUN

The Pacific Steamship Co. will put 10 vessels on their Alaska run this spring, according to an announcement made by Manager A. P. Haynes, recently returned from a tour of investigation along the Coast.

The new service will begin operation on March 1. The steamers Senator and Umattilla will be used on the Nome route, beginning May 23. The vessels on the new route include the steamers Admiral Wainwright, Northland, Ravall, Admiral Farragut, City of Seattle, Spokane, Admiral Goodrich, Curacao and the Admiral Watson.

ALCOHOL HARMFUL TO ARMY MARKSMEN

MUNICH, Feb. 9.—Tests recently conducted by the Bavarian ministry of war upon the effect of alcohol on marksmanship were carried out by 20 marksmen on 20 test days, the total number of shots fired being over 30,000.

The results showed, according to Prof. Dr. Krapelin, whose report on the subject is reprinted in the Military Weekly, an average falling off in marksmanship of about 3 per cent as the result of the consumption of 40 grams of alcohol, corresponding roughly to the amount contained in a liter of beer.



Mystery Man Held on Murder Charge

Such is the story, at least, the Pennsylvania board of pardons asserts, and placed him in a Jewish school. His skin, continued to grow darker, and Mrs. Hermann transferred him to another school. He disappeared when 18 years of age, and for years wandered about the country, for a time living in Lima and other Ohio cities. When he was completely black, he returned to New York, and for a time lived at the family residence. Then he disappeared, and was not again heard from.
