Blindness No Hindrance to Plucky Miners Who Start Seattle Broom Factory



George C. Holmes and John C. Moran, whom blindness could not discourage. Their eyesight gone, they nevertheless took up life anew—as partners in a broom factory.

A man who has always been extremely active cannot, when misfortune overtakes him, resign himself to a peaceful, quiet and monotonous inactivity. At least, George E. Holmes and John C. Moran, two men who, the blind, are running a broom factory, so declare. Just a few years ago Holmes

and Moran were hardy, active miners in Alaska, always going farther and farther in search of gold. But after they had sat in and many good hands had been dealt them, luck changed and both became blind.

Moran was working, four years ago, in a mine in the Fairbanks district. The mine shaft was warm—60 above. On top it was bitterly cold, but, not thinking, Moran came up, and the change from 60 above in the mine to 53 degrees below zero on top, chilled his eyes and started the trouble which later caused his blindness.

Flying Chip Blinds Holmes. Holmes was chopping a birch tree when a chip cut his left eye. He came to Seattle and had it removed, but soon lost the sight of the other eye, too.

"It's pretty hard to sit around and do nothing—harder yet when you have to eat and sleep and live," said Holmes. "We tried it for a while when we first came down from Alaska, but it didn't work."

Moran, who came down to Seattle in 1913, went to Vancouver, where he attended the school for the blind. There he learned the broom-making industry.

So They Open Factory Last fall, when Holmes came down, he couldn't stand the idleness any longer, so he got Moran to teach him the broom-making art. They got their heads together and decided to open a shop.

The first broom was turned out on New Year's day of this year. There are a good many processes to be gone thru before a broom is actually made—the broom corn has to be seeded, dyed, cured and the huri shredded. It takes about two pounds of broom corn to make one broom. Their capacity is two dozen brooms a day.

The men are specializing on a particular kind of broom, with a soft leaf fiber in it, that does the work. Besides brooms, they make shopping bags, hammocks, fishing nets, and do other odd work.
