



arrest of James Rowan, when speaking in the street July 31.

Rowan was about 25 feet from the corner and six or seven from the edge of the sidewalk.

"He was saying that the shingle weavers and longshoremen never would get anywhere by peaceful methods; that they would have to stay on the job and work from the inside. He recommended direct action, too, and illustrated it by telling about the Los Angeles Times."

Veitch questioned the sheriff in such a way as to draw out, by his answer, a consecutive story of arrests, deportations and trials several months preceding the Verona's arrival.

He said he worked with the police department because many disturbances took place near the city limits.

Paid Their Fare "Whenever they began a fight they invariably finished it outside the city limits," he said.

Ten men arrested on the shingle weavers' picket line were released on their promise to go back to Seattle, he testified.

"I paid their fare out of my own pocket, and then they asked for money to get a meal when they got to Seattle. I said 'no,' but Mills gave it to them, to get rid of them. They left peacefully."

A number of men arrested on August 22 at Hewitt and Wetmore, were sent back to Seattle, the sheriff said. One man, who had about \$40, was asked for money to pay the fare of the others, and a receipt was given him. This, the sheriff said, was the time when the departing I. W. W. said they would come back and "get" Officer Wildey, the sheriff and Sergeant Fox.

"I said, well, I'll be here when you come," he remarked.

On August 30, at a meeting called at the Commercial Club, at which Mayor Merrill and Chief Kelly asked him to be present, McRae said the mayor told the meeting "The situation was getting beyond his control," and asked help from the sheriff.

"What did you say?" asked Veitch.

"I said I couldn't handle it without more deputies. I had only my regular force then."

About 200 or 250 deputies were sworn in at that meeting, the sheriff said.

HELD OUT MONEY OF STATE FUND; STATE CHARGES

NEW RUSSIA IS TRYING TO GET ROUTE TO SEA

PETROGRAD, March 27.—The new Russia may break the grip of the central empires in the Balkans—may even bring about withdrawal of Bulgaria and Turkey from the war, according to developments today. Two moves by the new government leaders were cited as likely to have far reaching effect to this end.

First, is the plan of Minister of Justice Kerensky for "internationalization of Constantinople." He argues emphatically with President Wilson's dictum as to free outlets to the sea, and with his plan for neutralization of such outlets.


Second of the moves was a series of possible negotiations with the Bulgars reported in prospect today. Bulgaria's people are closer than any others in Russia; more sympathetic with their aims and, it is believed, they will be more sympathetic now that the reign of the Romanoffs is ended.

the dispute between Vanderveer and Veitch precipitated the judge's statement, which is considered as outlining about what he will charge the jury.

Excusing the jury from the room, he said:

"Gentlemen, the main facts of this case, in my opinion, are only two. 'Did somebody unjustifiably shoot Jefferson Beard?' and 'Did this defendant aid and counsel him in so doing?'"

"In my opinion, the whole thing is to be gauged by the sheriff. If the sheriff was assaulted unlawfully and Jefferson Beard was killed unjustifiably, murder was committed by somebody. If this defendant aided them, he was guilty.

"Whether these people went down there for a lawful or an unlawful purpose, the sheriff had no right to shoot them, if he shot first. If he was butting in, that would not justify them in shooting him, if they shot first.

"A lot of testimony has gone in that hasn't a thing to do with the case, except as it may enable the jury to get into the minds of the combatants. The question of free speech and all that is not on trial here."

"Your honor," interrupted Vanderveer, "that is just what we think is on trial. Our whole defense is that a long series of wrongs culminated in the worst of them all, the Verona affair, and that this man was not acting as a sheriff at all. There is an ordinance still unrevoked, allowing them to speak just where they were trying to speak.

"The whole question is, who shot first," declared Veitch. "But we wish to show the incidents leading up to the shooting."

A Union Man He testified that he was a member of the Shingle Weavers' union before he became sheriff, and in 1909 was international secretary, next to the highest office in the union, and had worked as a shingle weaver and in the woods since boyhood. The sheriff was asked about the
