



Twenty men have been recruited into the naval militia during the last two days' campaign. But recruiting will immediately stop when the call for mobilization comes, and the state's sailors are absorbed as individuals into the navy.

Five Chehalis boys, who joined the navy here Tuesday, were sent back home in uniform this morning to round up more recruits.

Miller Freeman, commander of the Washington naval militia, declared that mobilization orders are expected immediately following a vote of congress on the war situation.

Mrs. E. W. Stetson, wife of Lieut. Stetson of the naval militia, is heading the Women's auxiliary of the Navy league. The members have made ditty bags for the citizen-officers and will march, Friday noon, in the parade to stimulate recruiting.

The Seattle State club, which is the uniformed branch of the Order of Eagles, and the Eagles' band will take part in the patriotic parade Saturday night.

Frank P. Mullen, Crawford E. White and Robert Hopcroft have been appointed to represent the Eagles at all patriotic conferences.

Employees in the sheriff's office presented Miss Lila Watkins with a gold watch Wednesday evening. She left for Bremerton today to become a yeoman (stenographer) in the navy.

Navy recruits from Bremerton are scheduled to parade Friday noon, with Red Cross workers, in the campaign to stimulate recruiting.

Six young fellows from Wenatchee arrived in Seattle Thursday to join the navy.

Ninety-eight per cent of the Second Washington regiment of infantry at American lake have passed the regular army medical examinations.

The Seattle branch of the National League for Women's Service has appointed the following medical and nursing committee: Mrs. G. N. McLaughlin, chairman; Mrs. Ois. Floyd Lamson, detachment chairman; Dr. Irwin, Miss Frazier, Mrs. Turner, Mrs. Loomis, Miss Pringle, Miss Hall, Miss Major, Miss Newberg and Miss Loomis.

Denying that he had instructed F. Ota, a gambler, to send threatening letters to the Japanese emperor, or that he had had a hand in concocting plots against the throne, M. Furuya, wealthy merchant and banker of Seattle, took the stand Wednesday in the trial of four Japanese newspaper men, J. Ito Seruska, S. Kuwahara, S. Watanabe and K. Takahashi, charged with conspiracy to cause a run on the Japanese Commercial and Oriental American banks of Seattle, last fall.

Furuya said Watanabe tried to borrow money from him a year ago, and being refused, printed the attacks out of spite.

K. Takeuchi attempted to show that prior to the printing of letters attacking Furuya and his bank, the same charges had been made against him.

Objection of the defense to testimony of O. Yamaoka, who was brought from San Francisco as a witness, on the ground that he was a felon, was sustained. Yamaoka served 12 years in a Japanese prison for murder, the defense declared.

WITNESS IN TEARS TELLS OF CRUELTY

The most important witness Thursday morning in the case of Thomas H. Tracy, charged with murder during the Verona shooting at Everett last November, was Frank Henning, who, it is alleged, was beaten by Sheriff McTae early in September when a party of deputies raided a street meeting.

The witness had tears in his eyes when he told the story of his alleged persecution. He testified that he had been knocked down by the sheriff, who wielded a billy, and that while he lay on the street he was beaten severely with the same billy.

He was arrested, he said, and later released the same night. After he had his head bandaged by a physician, he went to his home with his wife, he said.

Mrs. Hannah Crosby, whose husband testified Wednesday, corroborated what he had said of the meetings. She claimed that always the speakers were opposed to violence and that they never resisted arrest.

Thomas H. Horner, a Seattle attorney, testified that he had seen the back of Rowan, the I. W. W. who is alleged to have been beaten by deputies.

THE SCOURGE OF WAR
AND
How to Organize an Army and Navy
By Edwin J. Brown.

I had intended to write this week on the dentists and the public, but that question must give way for a short time to the most momentous question our country has ever been called upon to deal with.

"Life is short, and the art long, the occasion instant, experiment perilous, decision difficult." How true these words and how hard, oh, how hard, to grasp the profound significance of their meaning when applied to the question with which we deal!

We point with pride to the achievements of a people, of their scientists, their art, their philosophy, their genius, but when we search among them for the elements and principles of democracy and humanitarianism, we search in vain, and why? Ah! Let me tell you why. It is because science, art, philosophy, genius and even religion are commercialized; nothing survives unless it pays, and anything survives, if it pays well enough.

Commercialism has strangled statesmanship, and profit has dethroned reason until the whirlpool of capitalism has drawn the nations of the earth into the maelstrom of a world war and thus do we cling dogmatically to the institutions that make war, while like hypocrites we pray for peace. War lowers every human instinct, standard of life and degrades the nation, dissipates the wealth and destroys the life of the people, but the people are helpless to stop it. (We are all creatures of our environment.)

Thus does this nation embark upon a war which it is impossible for it to keep out of any longer unless it would forfeit the very principles which a nation must cherish to remain a democracy. We cannot turn back and abandon the march of civilization toward a confederated, industrial democracy of the world. From all directions of the earth come the sweet and exhilarating voices of the nations demanding the abolition of autocracy.

HOW TO ORGANIZE AN ARMY PATRIOTISM, LIKE CHARITY, BEGINS AT HOME

Let not this nation clothe itself in a vain patriotism, like a painted one looking in a glass, but rather let us test our patriotism by our consideration for those upon whom will fall the duty of enforcing the decree of our nation in its demand for a democracy and our rights upon the globe.

Let us show our gratitude, appreciation and patriotism to our soldiers and sailors by paying them \$3.00 per day and board, and let the expense of the war be raised by a graduated income tax, beginning very small on all incomes of \$1,000 per year and increasing until the burdens of the conflict are so adjusted as to allow every man to say and feel that he has done his share.

The experience of Russia affords us evidence sufficient to warrant us in concluding that the universal mind condemns a patriotism which brings hardship, pain, anguish and death to those who bear arms and execute the demands of civilization, while the riches and the material wealth of the nation is concentrated into the hands of a few through the instrumentality of war.

Let the national government pay our soldiers and sailors \$3.00 per day, and let Seattle abolish the fifty-year age limit so that men here whose boys go to war may have the right to earn their living. Patriotism begins at home. But the noisy patriots seldom go upon the field of battle.
