# Hohenzollern Creed as Told by Frederick the Great

(Editor's Note.—Shortly after the war began, in 1914, The Star published the following article. It so aptly describes the Hohenzollern creed that it is republished today.)

Frederick the Great, third king of Prussia, reigned from 1740 to 1786, and stands out as the greatest figure of the Hohenzollern dynasty. He was a disciple of the God of War purely for what he could gain for Prussia by it. He instigated the last "world war,"—the "seven years' war"—involving all of Europe, because of his desire for territorial expansion. His war with Austria brought him Silesia, and his alliance with Russia caused the partition of Poland.)

Bismarck didn't invent the rule of "blood and iron." It was created a hundred years before his time, and by no less a person than Frederick the Great, third king of Prussia! Bismarck just developed it—defined it in the reign of William I.—and by its operation constructed the great German empire.

Frederick's imperial aspirations are revealed in a striking little pamphlet just discovered in the library of Wendell Phillips, the great American orator and abolitionist of Boston, who died in 1884. The pamphlet contains what is said to be the creed of the Hohenzollerns, laid down by the Great Frederick to his heir to the throne. The title reads:

INSTRUCTIONS TO HIS SUCCESSOR TO THE CROWN

ORIGIN OF THE BISMARCK POLICY OR THE HOHENZOLLERN DOCTRINES AND MAXIMS DESCRIBED AND DEFINED BY THE MOST EMINENT MONARCH OF THE PRUSSIAN DYNASTY, FREDERICK THE GREAT

Is the present kaiser following the creed and doctrines and commandments which, it is asserted, his illustrious predecessor laid down a century and a half ago?

Addressing "My dear nephew," Frederick says in the opening letter:

"Do not be so childish henceforth. **"WE MONARCHS TAKE WHAT WE CAN"**

"Always bear in mind that, with regard to kingdoms, we monarchs take what we can, when we can, and we are never in the wrong except when we are compelled to give up what we had taken.

"From the time of Tavillon to that of the great elector, our house was hardly able to support itself. There were 95 princes in the empire who were our equals in every respect; and, properly speaking, we were ourselves only a branch of the great empire of Germany.

"Many of our royal ancestors proved to be very bad characters. But chance and circumstances have greatly favored us. Our first diadem was placed on a vain and frivolous head, belonging to a crooked and distorted body."

Frederick refers to religion:

"Religion is absolutely necessary in a state government. The discussion of that maxim would be very impolitic, and a king is wrong when he allows his subjects to carry such discussions to excess. But, on the other hand, it is unwise for a king to have a religion.

"Mark this well, my dear nephew—there is nothing which tyrannizes over the mind and heart so much as religion, because it agrees neither with our passions nor with the high political views which a monarch should entertain.

"If a favorable opportunity of taking forcible possession of a neighboring province is offered, immediately an army of demons seem to him ready to defend it; he is weak minded enough to think he is going to commit an injustice, and he proportions the punishment of his crime to the extent of his evil designs.

"When he is about to conclude a treaty with some foreign power, if he remembers that he is a Christian he is lost.

**"SLIGHTEST SCRUPLE SPOILS YOUR WAR"**

"War is a business in which the slightest scruple spoils the whole matter. Where can an honest man be found willing to carry on a

war if he had not the right to make regulations justifying pillage, incendiarism and carnage?

"We must adopt our thought to our rank and standing in the world. It would be the height of folly if a monarch's attention was diverted by trifles which are fit only for the common people.

"Remember the following precept, my dear nephew, and always say as I do: In my kingdom people pray as they wish and find their salvation as they can. If you neglect that maxim ever so little, every thing will be lost for you in your kingdom."

As to policy, Frederick says:

"Do not be ashamed to make interested alliances from which only you yourself can derive the whole advantage. Do not make the foolish mistake of not breaking them when you believe that your interest requires it.

"On ascending the throne, I examined my father's treasury. His economy enabled me to conceive great projects. I then reviewed my troops and found them in superb condition. After this review I returned to my coffers again and took out from them funds enough to double my army. I kept my troops under arms and drilling constantly, and I did my best to draw the attention of all Europe to my movements.

**"MAKE THEM BELIEVE YOU ARE DANGEROUS"**

"I astonished the world. All the powers, all the nations, thought everything was over with them if they did not know how to move their heads, arms and legs a la Prussienne. All my officers and soldiers seemed to be worth twice as much when they saw they were imitated everywhere.

"Then, when my troops had reached this stage, I occupied myself with examining what claims I might lay to various provinces. I fixed my eye on Silesia, Polish Prussia, the Dutch Guelders and the Swedish Pomerania. I left to time the care of executing my designs on the other countries.

"In carrying out this program, my dear nephew, have plenty of money. Give your troops an air of superiority, wait for favorable circumstances, and you will be sure not only of preserving your kingdom, but of enlarging it.

"All of your neighbors must be quite persuaded that you are afraid of nothing, and that nothing can astonish you.

"Try especially to have them believe that you are a dangerous monarch, who knows no other principle than that which leads to glory."




