Here Are Six Big Weapons U.S. Can Hurl at the Kaiser

WEAPON NO. 1—The Navy
Our navy is the first weapon whose edge will be turned against the Kaiser. Its first duty is coast patrol, and no naval actions except against submarines or commerce raiders are to be expected so long as the German fleet is bottled up at Heligoland. Its presence will, however, release for more active service a number of British cruisers which have been patrolling the western Atlantic, and it will also tremendously relieve the strain on the British fleet.

WEAPON NO. 2—The Army
Our army may be called into service to repel attacks across the Mexican border fomented by Germany. Possibilities of domestic disturbances seem to infer that none of the present army will be sent abroad as an expeditionary force.

WEAPON NO. 3—Our Citizens
Back of our small but efficient regular army and the inefficient National Guard lies the material for the most magnificent army ever created—an army of 11,000,000 intelligent, trained and independent American citizens. Without congress the president has power to summon every man between the ages of 18 and 45. Recent figures show the total men subject to call is 21,071,916. But not all of these, of course, would be used. Many are needed for all-important work in the fields, factories and mines; many are undersized, and many have physical defects which would bar them from becoming part of the fighting forces. But even the most severe elimination would leave the material for an army which in two years could hold the ENTIRE WESTERN FRONT IN EUROPE.
Great Britain in two years has enlisted, trained and equipped nearly 5,000,000. Her population is only 45,000,000; ours is 100,000,000. If we do our bit as well as England, we should have ready for the field in two years ELEVEN MILLION fighting men, trained, equipped and hardened for the trenches.

WEAPON NO. 4—Foods
The greatest military expert living says famine, not arms, will end this war. We, and we alone, of all the earth have the power to pit plenty against famine and make victory against Germany sure. For the future our greatest concern must be not our own stomachs, but the stomachs of our fighting men and those of the allies. What can we do about food? Two things. Increase production and decrease useless consumption—cut out food waste. Here are the figures for the most important staples:
In 1916 the production of wheat was 640,000,000 bushels. This could be increased by 283,645,000 bushels and waste could be decreased 110,000,000 bushels, making a net increase of 393,645,000 bushels possible.
The production of corn in 1916 was 2,583,000,000 bushels, increased production of 173,000,000 bushels and decreased waste of 400,000,000 bushels would give a net possible increase of 573,000,000 bushels.
The 1916 production of potatoes was 285,437,500 bushels. If production is increased 57,843,000 bushels and waste decreased 50,000,000 bushels, the net increase possible would be 117,843,000 bushels.
The surplus which it is thus within our power to create will feed not only our own people, but enable England, France and Italy to keep their fighting men and their civilians in first-class condition.

WEAPON NO. 5—Munitions
The biggest lesson the war has taught is that the productive capacity of each man, each machine and each other manufacturing unit which has been "socialized" is nearly, if not quite, double what it had been under previous conditions.
It is estimated we can send an army of 11,000,000 men to war, if necessary, and we must at the same time build up our munitions and shipbuilding industries to supply and transport them.
To do this we must call on the women, just as England has done. Analysis of the census figures shows that there are at least 4,500,000 women of productive age not now engaged in gainful occupations who could be called on for industrial service.
Furthermore, almost one-fourth of our total manufacturing capacity today goes into production of articles we can dispense with.
The national defense council has listed and inventoried 27,000 plants, which can be used for munitions purposes. Many of these have had trial orders and are now ready to go to work on the special parts for which they are equipped.
Within a year these plants, together with the federal arsenals and the regular munitions plants, can turn out every day 500,000 large shells, 750,000 small shells and 5,000,000 cartridges a day, enough to supply the 11,000,000 soldiers.

WEAPON NO. 6—Wealth
Now the United States has cast its limitless wealth and resources into the balance against Germany, the doom of the central powers is sealed. This would be true even if we never send a single man to the trenches. Lord George said that silver bullets, not lead, would win this war. It is the silver and gold bullets that we can furnish in practically UNLIMITED quantities that make the success of the allies as inevitable as the rising of the sun.
FIFTY THOUSAND MILLION DOLLARS is the measure of wealth which the United States can mobilize for war purposes in the next two years if there is need, and we have the will. We can raise this incredible sum even more easily than Great Britain has raised the twenty-five billions which she has spent on the war to date.
Official estimates of our national wealth place it at \$250,000,000,000, while Great Britain's is only \$90,000,000,000. With the same strain upon our wealth and resources that Great Britain has placed upon hers, we can raise nearly \$64,000,000,000. At the present cost of the war to the allies, this would cover half of the cost for 1,600 days, or nearly four and a half years.
It is the knowledge that this limitless wealth and the incalculable resources which it represents will, if there is need, be thrown into the scales against Germany that will end the war. It may take some time for full realization of this to reach the Kaiser-controlled people; but when it does, the Teutonic resistance will crumble, and the war will end as suddenly as it began.

"Yes," agreed "Joe." Later I found his real name was Bahor Habib.
"Your country's in it, too," I said, with the patronizing air one usually uses toward a bootblack and a "for-gigner."
Joe lifted his brush from my shoes and straightened his back.
"This is my country," he said simply.
"You are a citizen?"
"I work here; I live here. It is my country. President Wilson is my president. War never helped any business. It will end mine, but I am—what you call it?—standing behind the president."
Thus fired by patriotism, Joe began to expound preparedness.
"You come into my shop," he said, "and you grab me by the arm, and you say, 'Come along! Get out!' I fold my hands, so, and you keep me. But, no; I am what you say, 'preparing.' I see you coming; I say 'This is my shop. You go 'way!' I heet you and you no keek back. You get out. Same way United States and Kaiser."
By all rights Bahor Habib should be "on the other side." He is a Turkish Jew. He left his home 16 years ago and wandered about the face of the globe until he found Seattle, three years ago, and here he has made his home since.
He's a bootblack and has his stand between Second and Third aves., on Pike st.

DYNAMITE CACHE SHAKES ARRAS CITY
