OUR HEALTH TEETH

The Dentist and the Public

Naturally there is some exaggeration about the condition of the teeth having such a direct bearing upon the health of the person, yet there can be no doubt but that the condition of the teeth has a corresponding influence upon the general health.

It is a very common thing for a person to gain a few pounds in weight after having a few old rotten snags extracted and teeth put in that can be used to masticate with. This is my claim, and it is one thing that I can do, that is, make artificial teeth that a person can eat with.

Instructions for Using Artificial Teeth

Many users of artificial teeth fail to get the full benefit and efficiency from their use. For this reason we feel it a duty to advise wearers of artificial teeth upon this very important question.

Different animals have widely different movements of the jaws when engaged in masticating their food.

The camel grinds its food with a lateral motion, the lower jaw moving from side to side and grinding the food between its teeth.

The elephant employs a crushing movement by lowering the lower jaw and then bringing it up, the teeth of the upper and lower jaw coming together with such force that the food is crushed instead of being ground.

The wolf employs a backward and forward sawing movement of the lower teeth against the upper teeth, and mangles its food before swallowing.

The human being (animal) has the combined movements of mastication of all other animals. When we have our natural teeth we can grind with a lateral motion, crush with a direct, pressing motion, or incise and mangle our food with the sawing movement. As I said before, when we have our natural teeth, we have and may employ all of these movements of mastication of the lower animals.

When Plates Are Worn It's Different

When artificial teeth are placed in the human mouth the method of mastication is changed, and we are compelled to adopt and accommodate the movement of our lower jaw to the crushing straight up and down motion, employed by the elephant, when we grind or chew our food. If we wish to incise or use the cutting motion with the front teeth, like when biting an apple, we must press the apple gently against the teeth when biting, because this will give a pressure against the resistance afforded by the alveolar ridge and keep the plates more firmly in place for the purpose of biting.

The Spirit of '17

Officers of the Young Men's Republican club have decided to postpone the club's annual election, set for Saturday night, in order that the members can attend the patriotic parade, also scheduled for Saturday evening.

Training camp dates for civilians that live in the Western military department have been given out. The citizens of Washington will have a chance of drill at American lake from August 11 to September 9.

Lieut. Com. William B. Allison, executive officer of the Washington naval militia, was the guest of the executive committee of the Young Men's Republican club, at luncheon Friday, at the Good East cafe. He spoke on the work of the naval militia.

For the civilian who believes that he should attain some degree of preparedness for war, but at the same time does not feel at liberty to enlist in the National Guard, the civilian military instruction camps are just the right thing.

Adj. Gen. Maurice Thompson of the Washington National Guard said upon his arrival for the East, Thursday night, that he had no authority to organize a volunteer force of any kind.

A number of university boys have been inquiring at the marine corps headquarters about examinations for commissions. These will be held in June, so if you think you can make the grade, you've got a couple of months to study.

The Coliseum is going to have a "Navy" night next Tuesday evening. It's for the sailor boys, and there will be special features, including the views of naval preparations. The ushers will be attired in navy uniforms, too.

Every resource of King county is at the disposal of the president. The board of county commissioners adopted resolutions Friday, tendering all aid and co-operation to the government.

The old county courthouse has been offered as a medical supply depot, there being none north of San Francisco.

All employees who respond to the call to colors will find their jobs awaiting them when they return, and the commissioners have bound themselves to practice the strictest labor economy, in order that greater aid may be given the federal government.

MOORE WOULD MAKE CHANGES

A project calling for the expenditure of \$400,000 and the removal of 1,500,000 cubic yards of earth will be started Monday in council by Councilman Moore, who believes that, because of the collapse of the Dearborn st. bridge and the effect of slides at the northern end of Beacon hill, property values have depreciated to an extent where an emergency act of the council is necessary.

Moore's plan is almost the same as that of the streets committee two years ago. However, he proposed to form a condemnation district between Dearborn and Judkins sts. and Tenth and 14th aves. When this area is regraded, he plans to plat and sell it.

The slicing of earth from the east side of 12th ave. S., between Charles and Judkins, will make it necessary to move the car line from the avenue to the new strip and from the bridge to Charles st.

U. S. FLAG NOW FLIES OVER LABOR TEMPLE

Old Glory is flying from the Labor Temple today. The flag was hoisted after a delegation of patriotic union stage hands marched down to a store, purchased the colors, then marched back again.

They refused to consider the action of the labor leaders who earlier in the week objected to flying the flag, while the state of war resolutions were still pending at the national capital.

Men, with hats and coats off, cheered while Frank Gates, of the Painters' union, pulled the banner up the flag pole.

SPY CATCHERS ARE AFTER VOLUNTEERS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 7.—Persons who speak German, Austrian or other foreign languages, photographers, amateur or professional, and, in fact, practically all responsible adults in California, Oregon, Washington, Montana, Idaho, Nevada and Utah, will have a chance to serve their country in the Nathan Hale volunteer organization, the organization of which is being started today by the intelligence bureau of the Western army department. The purpose is to assist the government in secret investigations.

ARMY ASKING FOR TECHNICAL MEN

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Secretary of War Baker asked the house military affairs committee today to insert in the general staff army bill a new provision for conscripting technical or technically trained men for the army, for use as engineers and signal men and the like.

BREAD RATIONS IN BERLIN REDUCED

BERLIN, via London, April 7.—The bread ration will be reduced, beginning April 16. It was formally announced today. On the same date the meat ration will be doubled and the price reduced, the government paying the difference in price.

Seize Wireless

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Shortly after noon today the navy department completed the task of taking over all commercial wireless stations in the United States and its possessions.

In all, 56 stations are now under navy control. The navy is now engaged in closing and dismantling all private, amateur stations throughout the country.

COUNTY FOOD CONTROL URGED

CENTRAL BODY TO REGULATE SUPPLY, IS PLAN

A central committee to lay plans for the mobilization for war of the food resources of King county was appointed at a citizens' meeting held at the county commissioners' offices Saturday morning. The committee will at once meet and formulate plans for carrying out the suggestions of Gov. Lister, made in his proclamation to the people of the state soon after the declaration of war. The Star has advocated a similar plan for some time.

The committee is composed of J. A. Wood, representing the Chamber of Commerce; Agriculturist T. W. Rader, representing the county; A. W. Graves, the bankers; Commissioner L. C. Smith, the county; R. T. Reed, the farmers; James Hart, the farmers; W. A. Brady, the wholesalers; Mrs. A. J. Goddard, the Consumers' league.

"It isn't our comfort, our pleasure or our amusement that counts. We are at war, and it is only the things that will prosecute that war to a quick and successful closing that we are especially interested in," declared Nathan Eckstein, of the school board.

Eckstein told the meeting that the assistance of the federal authorities was necessary before the first co-operation asked in the proclamation of Gov. Lister could be obtained.

Chickens and Bull Pups
Mayor Gill concurred in this sentiment, declaring that "what we need is a few more chickens and not so many bull pups."

It is the necessities of life, and nothing but the necessities of life, that we are concerned about. Let us raise as much as we can and let us raise it wherever we can," he said.

Confessing a lack of knowledge of local conditions, Executive Secretary Corbaley, of the Chamber of Commerce and Commercial Club, spoke of the need for agricultural preparedness, and held that a board with absolute power to control food supply and food marketing should be created.

This suggestion found instant popularity, and was the basis for the final action of the meeting. The cooperation of the road and school organizations, which reach to all parts of the county, was urged by Corbaley.

County Agriculturist Rader told of the difficulties in marketing and of the co-operation of the home which might be expected thru the school.

County Charity Commissioner Callaghan was another speaker who promised the full and complete support of his office in the prosecution of any plans which might be adopted.

The meeting was presided over by County Auditor Wardall, and was attended by about 50 men and women from all walks of life.

SISTER LEILA DIES; RESULT OF BURNS

Sister Mary Leila, 26, of the St. Edwards school at 42nd ave. S. and Mead st., died Friday morning at the Providence hospital from burns received Friday noon, when she was making turpentine and lard for a patient at the school.

The dead woman was a native of Ireland. Her body is held at the Providence hospital, in charge of Joseph Manning, undertaker.

Smith, of the Women's League for National Service; Frank P. Mullen, of the Eagles; David Whitcomb, of the Chamber of Commerce, and Harold Preston, of the Bar association.

Billions for Allies

WASHINGTON, April 7.—The extension of a credit to the allies of over one billion dollars and probably as much as five billion will be the first step of actual participation in the war under the plan to be suggested to congress by the president, it was learned today.
