WANT SAME DATE FOR ALL EASTER

NEW YORK, April 7.—Business men in the United States and Europe are planning to change the calendar so Easter would come on a definite day each year.

This change alone, they say, would mean a saving of \$10,000,000.

In many parts of France, Germany and Italy Easter is the beginning and end of the year, for such purposes as signing agricultural contracts, renting houses, closing theatres, and sets a fixed date for the millinery and dressmaking trades. If they had an established date for Easter, business men say, they could carry on their trades on a firmer basis, and so save \$10,000,000 a year.

Their plan is to give each month 30 days, add a day to each third month, make the 365th day New Year's day, between December 31

and January 1, and put leap year day every fourth year between July 31 and August 1.

A particular Sunday could be chosen for Easter, and other church holidays would follow in their regular order.

GARDINAL SOUNDS CALL FOR LOYALTY

BALTIMORE, April 7.—Cardinal Gibbons sounded the call for whole-hearted American support of President Wilson, last night, when he termed it the "primary duty of every citizen to show loyalty to the country." Loyalty, he declared, "is manifested more by acts than words; by solemn service rather than empty declamations. It is exhibited by absolute and unreserved obedience to his country's call. The members of both houses of congress are the instruments of God in guiding us in our civic duties."

HUNT FOR SPIES ON IN EARNEST THRUOUT U. S.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—The roundup of German plotters and all enemies of the republic is in full blast today.

Chief interest at this time centers on men who have long been trailed and card indexed because of their associations with the plotters' rings established in various sections of the country by Von Papen and Boy-Ed.

Watch Arsenal
While department of justice and secret service agents work in deepest secrecy, refusing for obvious reasons to disclose even facts of arrests that have been made, it is taken for granted that another chief objective in the hunt is to keep war-time watch on the thousands of German reservists here who were unable to answer the call to the colors.

It is known positively today that it has been from these men—chiefly reservists of younger years—that Boy-Ed and Von Papen drew material for their work of intrigue against this government.

While it is known that many of these men refused to do the bidding of Germany's spy masters in America, many did fall before the temptation of gold and promises of high reward in the event of war between the two countries.

Another nest of "plotters" was Germany's consular service in America. Such aliens as had close connection with the Kaiser's consular agents, and who cannot satisfactorily explain those connections, are to be arrested at the first suspicious action.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—President Wilson today received personal messages of congratulation on his stand in accepting the German challenge to war from King George of England and Victor Emmanuel of Italy.
