She's New Head of Capital City Club

Mrs. Towner has succeeded Mrs. Altee Pomeroy as president of the Congressional club of Washington, composed of wives of congressmen. She is one of the most popular matrons at the capital.

Declaring himself confident that "every member of the naval force which this state has furnished to the federal government will acquit himself with credit and to the best of his ability," Gov. Ernest Lister has wired the officers and men of the Washington naval militia at Bremerton, thanking them for the prompt and efficient mobilization last week.

There is much speculation as to where the Coast artillery will be sent. Some say to Hawaii and some to the Panama canal, while there is a widespread rumor that the companies will be converted to field artillery.

No mail can be sent from this country to Germany, Austria, Hungary, Bulgaria, Turkey or Luxembourg. The ban extends to the latter countries because they can be reached only thru Germany. All postal employees' leaves of absence, except for sickness or military duty, have been canceled because of the rush of work occasioned by the declaration of war.

"The kids fought the civil war, and it's the kids who are going to fight this one," said R. H. Hall, a veteran in the 53rd Ohio, Company D, who lives at 910 Stewart st. "Don't underestimate the boys," he said. "Some day we will be just as proud of the boys of '17 as we are of the boys of '61 and '65."

Representatives of patriotic and fraternal orders of Seattle will meet at the Press club theatre Tuesday night, to form a local council of patriotic service to handle war problems here.

A meeting to organize a Red Cross auxiliary will be held next Tuesday morning, at 10 o'clock, at the Kirkland Congregational church.

Alfred Flak, 19, son of Republican Leader T. P. Flak of Mason county, had his appendix removed, so he could enlist in the engineering corps of the regular army.

Twenty-eight U. of W. instructors have joined the faculty company and will drill one hour daily. The company was formed by Capt. W. T. Patten, because their duties prevent the faculty men from attending the reserve officers' school.

Recruiting officers are pinning yellow ribbons on the coats of the long line of men who are applicants for marriage licenses at the Cook county, Illinois, courthouse. It is charged that Chicago men are choosing marriage as a lesser evil than war.

Joy dwells in the hearts of 12 of Washington's naval militia officers, who were rejected when the militia was called to colors because of slight physical defects. Telegrams received last night indicate that the navy department will waive technicalities and permit the men to assume their duties as officers of the navy.

The Seattle public library is saving magazines, and these will be distributed by the state Y. M. C. A. and the Boy Scouts to the Washington troops now under arms.

Applications continue to come in for enlistment in the naval militia, which automatically went out of existence with the mobilization order. Not even stragglers—those who were at distant points when the naval militia call came, and could not get here sooner—are accepted. Many of them are joining the navy.
