

BOY WITNESS CORROBORATES RIFLE ANGLE

The defense Monday morning in the case of Thomas Tracy accused of the shooting of Deputy Jefferson Beard last November 5, when the steamer Verona, with I. W. W.'s aboard, attempted to land at the Everett city dock, adopted new tactics in its attempt to impeach the evidence of state's witnesses as to the occurrences on the dock.

A number of young boys of Everett who went to the dock immediately after the shooting and collected exploded shells, were placed on the stand. Their testimony that they found rifle shells, which were produced in court, tends to disprove a major contention of state's witnesses that the rifles were not used during the shooting.

Jack Warren, 11, was the first boy witness. He was not at all awed by the court and at no time showed the slightest discomfiture, answering all questions clearly and distinctly.

Corroborates Evidence
He said he found a number of shells near the Klatawa slip, where prior witnesses have testified two men knelt firing rifles. Several small caliber rifle shells were introduced in evidence, without objection by the state.

Palmer Strand, 13, was the next witness.

Sold 45 Shells
"We got there right after the shooting," he said, "and started to pick up the shells. I sold about 45 to John Hanson, the shoemaker. Yes, a lot of them was rifle shells, and over in front of the dock I saw a lot of shotgun shells, but I didn't save any."

He brought to court 25 shells of all calibers, ranging from a large rifle to a small automatic revolver cartridge.

His testimony was important because he declared that he had found rifle shells where Sheriff McRae fell and because he had found them at every point, the defense charges "sharpshooters" were located.

FRENCH LAUNCH FRESH ATTACKS AT THE TEUTONS

WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES IN THE FIELD, April 23.

—Germany has just gone through the most disastrous week of her history in the war. Today, the week's anniversary of the great French drive, the French army staff permits me to say that the coming seven days are likely to unfold more clearly the nature of the Franco-British offensive. The fighting which is now in progress is of vital importance.

Here Are Results
Since Monday, a week ago, when the great French offensive began, Gen. Nivelle's forces have accomplished this:

- Capture of more than 100 guns from the Germans.
- Taking of 20,000 German prisoners.
- Occupation of 20 large villages—not including hamlets.
- Retaking of about 50 square miles of French territory.
- Inflicted losses in killed, wounded and missing conservatively estimated at 100,000.

BRITISH WIN BY MORNING ATTACKS

LONDON, April 23.—Over a wide front on both sides of the river Scarpe, Field Marshal Haig early today resumed the British drive with a tremendously forceful attack.

VASHON ISLAND FERRY IS SUNK

The Vashon Island ferry sank at the Des Moines dock Monday morning some time between midnight and 4 o'clock. The cause had not been discovered late Monday.

The ferry, which was but a few years old and cost the county \$50,000, apparently was in good condition when Watchman Jack Morey left it at midnight. When he returned at 4 o'clock, only the roof of the pilot house was above water. A few weeks ago a heavy wind carried away a part of the Des Moines dock, and repairs to the extent of several thousand dollars are now being made.

Vashon residents were to go before the county commissioners next week to ask that the ferry landing be moved north near Seattle.

SPY SUSPECT IS NABBED HERE BY SECRET SERVICE

An alleged German spy is being held by the department of justice, pending an investigation on a charge of having wireless apparatus in his possession. Howard P. Wright, of the department refused to discuss the matter Monday morning, admitting that the man was being held, but declining to make known his name.

The man was turned over to the authorities by the captain of the Admiral Dewey Saturday. His apparatus is said to have been concealed in a suit case.

FILL OUT AND MAIL

Seattle, Wash. 1917.

To Members of Congress of the United States of America:

We believe in the conscription of large incomes as a means for conducting the war; we also believe in limiting the profits to be derived from the sale of munitions and necessities.

We therefore favor the proposal to limit profits on munitions to 3 1/2 per cent and on the basic necessities to 6 per cent, and to levy a war tax on incomes above \$5,000 per year; namely, 2 per cent up to \$10,000, and a higher rate on larger incomes, ultimately in a tax of 100 per cent on incomes larger than \$100,000 per annum, for any one person.

We urge upon you the enactment of legislation to this end, and confidently expect from it results of great benefit to the American people and to all mankind.

CONSCRIPTION IN U. S. IS HOPE OF BRITISH OFFICIALS

LONDON, April 23.—Americans here join with the British in the hope that the U. S. will raise its army by conscription—not volunteer draft. A careful canvass of scores of prominent Americans here, together with the views expressed in the lobbies of the house of commons, are enthusiastic over the idea that America send an expeditionary force at as early a day as possible, under Roosevelt or any other leader.

But almost without exception the members privately expressed a strong warning that America benefit by England's experience and avoid the stripping of the nation of trained men needed to organize and drill the proposed big army.

GERMANS CLAIM ALL ATTACKS REPULSED

BERLIN, via London, April 23.—Fighting on a wide front, with repulse of English attacks by counter thrusts, was announced in today's official report.

"Yesterday, to the northwest of Lens, the English penetrated into our first line on a distance of about 500 meters," the statement said. "They were driven back by a counter-attack."

GERMAN BATTLESHIP SAILS FROM LIBAU

PETROGRAD, April 23.—A German battleship and cruiser squadron has left Libau, presumably to attempt an attack behind the Russian lines from the Baltic, according to official word. It was reported that another German warship squadron was en route to the Russian Baltic positions from Kiel.

JUDGE SMITH has granted an injunction preventing state and county officials from prosecuting the Ferry Line Bus Co. in West Seattle, for operating without a license until the decision against it is fought out in the state supreme court.
