We in America have the reputation of being the most extravagant people on earth, and that it is always difficult to establish a general charge such as that, there is probably enough truth in it to make it wise for us in this crisis to look around for opportunities of saving. First of all, economy in food consumption is a duty we owe to the poorer people in our midst. Extravagance means constantly rising prices, and this must inevitably involve hardship for those with small incomes.

Let us keep the demand as low as is consistent with necessity, and we shall thus regulate the prices and help our neighbor.

Further, if we purchase only what is necessary, and cut out all luxury, both in degree and in kind, we will have all the more money to spare for the purchase of war bonds, and to purchase as many as we have money for would seem to me a very obvious as well as an urgent duty for every citizen and friend of America today. This is a part that may be played in the great struggle by every man and woman with a little ready cash. Let us therefore save our money and lend it to the country, instead of wasting it on things that do no good to any one.

Seattle to See How U. S. Ambulance Drivers Perform

Renewed interest is aroused in the American ambulance field service by the enlistment of Churchill Peters, son of W. A. Peters, of Seattle, who goes to France with the unit from Yale university.

The American ambulance field service has grown from five cars to 500 cars, and over 500 American drivers. All cars are Fords, and all the drivers native-born Americans.

These young drivers work without salary and pay their own expenses. New men and new material are constantly necessary.

Up to March 1, 1917, over 750,000 cases of wounded have been transported by our American boys. Seattle will see the pictures of these boys under actual battle conditions, taken by the French government, and displayed in Seattle under the auspices of the American field service, at the Arena, at 8:30 p. m., Thursday, May 24. A large committee of Seattle men and women is taking charge of the affair, and tickets are on sale at Swift's pharmacy, Second and Pike, and the Leary building cigar stand.
