BRITISH AGAIN SEND INFANTRY IN GRIM DRIVE

WAR SITUATION TODAY

WEST FRONT—British today resumed infantry attacks after 11-day lull near Lens, report a successful air raid on Bruges and artillery bombardments at Ypres. Germans launch successful attacks against French.

ITALIAN FRONT—Aircraft and artillery busy while infantry rests. Austrians claim to have captured 500 men from Italian trenches.

MACEDONIAN FRONT—French attacking Bulgars.

MOLDAVIAN FRONT—Rumanians attacking Teutons.

MESOPOTAMIAN FRONTIER—Russians defeat Turks.

LONDON, June 4—Fierce fighting by British, French and Germans was resumed on the west front Sunday, continuing all thru the night, and is still going on. This breaks the lull of two weeks and means that violent infantry efforts are again being launched.

The Germans, Sunday morning, in a sharp attack, gained a footing at Cherisy, seven miles from Arras, near the road to Comper.

This was wrested back by the British Sunday night and in early morning hours today.

Repulse Raids
Field Marshal Haig reported his men had advanced into a enemy trench east of Vermelles, which is midway between Lens and La Bassée. The Germans made hostile raids which were repulsed.

Many air planes are being lost on each side.

Infantry bombardments are going on heavily in the Ypres sector to the north, but no infantry fighting has been reported. Military experts believe Haig is testing out various spots in the German line, preparatory to a resumption of his drive.

GERMANS GAIN POSITIONS
PARIS, June 4.—German infantry suddenly launched attacks on French positions and gained a foothold northwest of Froidmont at 11 p. m. Sunday. On the plateau of Valenciennes and Calonne, they took several French positions, but did not attack with infantry. One French raid was successful in Champagne.

German air men made successful raids on Dunkirk and Nancy, killing several civilians Sunday.

BOMB ATTACKS ON BRUGES
LONDON, June 4.—"Good results" were obtained from a bombing attack carried out over the dock and canal at Bruges last night, the admiralty announced today.

INFANTRY QUIET
ROME, June 4.—Aircraft and artillery are fighting on the Italian front today, but infantry fighting is quiet.

CAPTURE 500 MEN
VIENNA, June 4.—In the San Marco district, Austrian infantry ejected Italians from front trenches and captured 500 men, ten officers and four machine guns.

FRENCH ARE REPULSED
SOEFT, June 4.—French troops are attacking on the Macedonian front again, but the Bulgarians are repulsing them.

RUMANIANS ACTIVE
BERLIN, June 4.—Rumanian troops attacked Teutonic positions on the Moldavian front Saturday and Sunday nights, but were repulsed.

FUSSIANS WINNING
PETROGRAD, June 4.—Russian troops have defeated Turks, taking three heights in the Sakiz region of the Mesopotamian frontier.

GERMANS FAIL TO LAND DIVER BASE

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Minister Dominioli of Venezuela has denied reports that German influence has procured a submarine base on the coast of Venezuela, and declares that nothing could arise to change the friendly attitude of his country for the United States.





SELECT SERVICE QUERIES

Q.—I left my home in India when a little boy, between the ages of 13 and 15, and worked for about 12 years on ships all over the world. I never kept track of my birth date or age. I quit the sea and married five years ago. My wife, thru a recent accident, lost her toes. I took out my first papers a few months ago, and not knowing the exact date of my birth, said 1888. My mother, who is still in India, informs me now that I was born December 18, 1885. Must I correct my statement regarding my first papers, or must I register as my papers call my age, or will I be exempted with my wife in her condition?

A.—Your case is a good example of some of the perplexing tangles that the district boards may have to grapple with in determining exemptions. In the first place, you will probably not be called upon to serve if your wife is solely dependent upon you. The fact that she has lost her toes will probably not enter into the matter. You might attempt to straighten out the mistake as to your age, if you have sufficient proof to support your claim. If you were born in 1885 you are now 32, and not required to register. When a man really doesn't know how old he is, but official records name a date, these records would no doubt be difficult to dislodge.

Q.—Does a boy of 19 have to register if he has served two years in the army? And will he have to go to the front?

A.—A boy of 19 doesn't have to register, no matter what he has been doing. Only men who have passed their 21st birthday, but not passed their 31st birthday have to register.

Q.—Can a fireman be compelled to go to war if he has been married since March?

A.—Firemen must register, the same as all other men within the prescribed age limits. If married, they will no doubt be exempted from the first call, if their wives are SOLELY dependent upon them.

Q.—Do single firemen have to go?

A.—Ten million men are expected to register. Only 500,000 will be called. No instructions have been received indicating that firemen would be exempted because of their occupation.

Q.—Is a man who has lost his citizenship by reason of having served in naval prison, subject to draft?

A.—He must register, but might make a claim for exemption on the ground that he is morally deficient. His naval experience, however, might result in his being accepted, despite his record.

Q.—I am not a citizen of this country, and I have not my first papers. I desire to know whether I should use the name I was christened with, or the assumed name I took after having entered this country?

A.—It might be wise to give both names and let the registration officials do the worrying over this technicality, after you explain it to them.

Q.—Does a man who has taken the first citizenship papers in this country have to fight for her under this new law?

A.—He has to register if he is past 21, but not yet 31. Whether or not he'll be exempted is another matter not yet determined by the government.

Q.—How is a man going to prove he is past 31 years of age if the authorities won't take his word for it?

A.—Almost every man's age is on record somewhere. So, if it develops to the point where he must prove his age, he should attempt to present some record as evidence.

However, there will probably be few contests on this point.

Q.—Isn't there an old treaty, signed up between the United States and Germany, in which the United States would not call on Germans, even if they are citizens of the United States, to fight against Germany, but would call upon these German citizens if the United States was at war with any other country except Germany and Austria-Hungary?

A.—If there is such a treaty, it has not come to light in the instructions issued by the federal government concerning registration for select service.

Q.—If a man registers June 5 and becomes 31 June 6, but is exempted on account of having a family solely dependent upon him for support, is his name still kept on the records, and is he subject to call at future drawings?

A.—No special provision is made for the man who becomes 31 one day after registration, any more than for the fellow who becomes 31 one year after registration. His record, as obtained next Tuesday, will no doubt be kept, and he will no doubt be subject to future drawings, if there are any.

Q.—Does a married man with dependents have to file his claim for exemption before June 5?

A.—No. He may never have to make a formal claim.
