Dr. Mark A. Matthews is going to Washington, D. C. In fact, he's on his way East now, having left at 10 a. m. He's going to see his old chum, Woodrow, with whom he got pretty thick when he was moderator of the Presbyterian church of America.

And he'll have a talk with his old pal, Gregory, the attorney general.

And he'll have a little chat with good old Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the Interior. And he'll put in a boost for national prohibition.

And he'll put in a boost for equal suffrage.

And he'll put in several boosts for wood shipbuilding on the Pacific Coast.

Outside of that, and several other little things, the doctor won't have a thing to do while he's at the national capital.

Dr. Matthews and President Wilson are personal friends of long standing.

"I believe the success of the war will be influenced in a large measure by making the nation dry," Dr. Matthews declared before leaving.

**To Urge Woman Suffrage**  
"And since the women are to do a goodly portion of men's work now, surely there is no valid argument left why they should not be entitled to an equal voice and vote in the government."

"From printed statements, I gather that Gen. Goethals is unfriendly to wood shipbuilding. Not only will a program of opposition to wooden ship construction be detrimental to the Northwest, but it will be disastrous to the nation because it means delay in furnishing the necessary carrying capacity for food shipments across the seas."

**DONATION MEN PINCHED AGAIN**

Seven "donation bus" drivers, who were free on bail and operating their cars, were rearrested on complaints that they accepted fares Tuesday morning. In addition eight other drivers were arrested. The seven "second timers" were released on bonds of \$200, while the others were allowed to post \$100 guarantees.

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**WAR DULLS CAMPUS**

67 of Class of '17 Volunteer for War Work

Once more the dusty attics of the University neighborhood have yielded up the ghosts of former years. The dingy old academic gowns that have shrouded a collegian at his last graduation rites have been brought to light again. Wednesday is commencement day.

The various houses which in college time are the abodes of undergraduates are wrecks. Old collars, old note books, old cadet uniforms, clutter the floors, thrown out in the wild eleventh hour search for that accursed gown that John, or Henry, as the case may be, wore last year. And the torn mortarboard that belonged with it, which was found behind the piano in the last laps of a desperate search, is ready for use, except for a missing tassel.

**It's Annual Affair**  
The search for caps and gowns for the commencement exercises at the university is an annual one. Each house sports at least three. And if the dark recesses of garret or trunk room fail to produce the required articles, they must be rented. From a pecuniary standpoint, that is impossible at commencement time.

Graduation has a peculiar significance to the collegian. It means he will no longer be able to borrow his fraternity brother's shirt studs, cuff links, razor blades, dancing pumps and socks, when his own have wandered elsewhere. And it means he must part with six or seven co-eds who fancied he was their own.

**BUY BONDS AND TURN 'EM OVER TO RED CROSS**

Buy a Liberty Bond and then donate it to the Red Cross fund!

That's the way to kill two birds with one stone, to do a bit for Uncle Sam's war chest and the drive for Red Cross contributions at the same time.

That was the answer given by Hazen J. Titus Tuesday to any one who suggested that the two campaigns were competitive.

Titus, who has been loaned by the Northern Pacific to manage the publicity campaign for the Red Cross campaign here, was directing a corps of assistants in the Arcade building at top speed today.

**Sing on Streets**  
He detailed Mrs. A. Odin to organize singing squads of four, eight and 12 women, to go up and down the street later in the week. They'll sing "America" and "The Marseillaise." Crowds on the sidewalks are expected to join in the singing.

Great electric red crosses mounted with a battle field float on a traction car, and already being pulled thru the residence and business sections.

**Wire President**  
Titus had planned to pitch military tents on the street corners, and place soldiers and nurses in them. When he found he couldn't borrow military tents, he immediately wired President Wilson.

"The seriousness of the need for Red Cross funds now must be hammered home to every man, woman and child in Seattle," Titus told his helpers.

One of them had trouble getting donations of materials from a business man.

**Must Raise \$300,000**  
"You didn't make him understand," Titus said. "When they understand they'll give anything or everything they've got."

President Wilson has called for \$100,000,000 for Red Cross organization. Seattle's allotment is \$300,000. None of the money will be spent for campaign expenses. It will all be used to equip and send nurses and supplies to the battle fronts with American soldiers.

Appeals for money will start Monday. Teams will solicit from every man at every home.

**PEANUT INCREASING IN POPULARITY**

How the war is increasing the production of peanuts in the United States is illustrated in figures furnished by E. R. Rogers, president of the Rogers Company, Seattle and Tacoma food manufacturers.

For several months the Rogers Company has been experiencing a more rapid sale than during any previous period in the sales of peanut butter, the essential element of which is peanut oil. This oil is about 40 per cent of the weight of the peanut. In Europe this oil is extracted and is widely used in its fluid form. But the typical American product is peanut butter.

Figures just compiled by Mr. Rogers show that in 1908 the yield of peanuts in the United States was estimated to be worth \$12,000,000, while last year a conservative estimate puts the total value of the crop at \$150,000,000. A survey of the peanut growing districts by the United States Government indicates that the harvest in 1917 will be between 50,000,000 and 55,000,000 bushels and that it will sell for \$1.10 a bushel.

"The food value of the peanut is such as to make a universal market for the product," he said. "The government is conducting experiments designed to increase the popularity of the peanut in American kitchens. It has been found by the government experts that 10 cents' worth of peanuts have in them as much nutriment as 20 cents' worth of porterhouse steak, 25 cents' worth of milk or 13 cents' worth of potatoes. A dime's worth of the homely goober contains 120 grams of protein, more food value than the authorities say is adequate for the consumption of a human being in one day.

"With wheat and eggs and meats rising so high, by reason of Europe's diminished production and by reason of the waste ravaged by submarines, it is no wonder that American housewives are turning in large numbers to peanut butter for a food that costs less, is a revelation in its delight to the palate and is likely to retain the favor it is thus gaining."
