

ONCE AGAIN THE TALK of Portland coming into the Northwestern league is being heard around the circuit. The cause for it this time is the refusal of several Portland players to accept a cut in the pay envelope, despite the fact that the Coast league cities are not supporting their ball clubs as they have in the past.

In a recent interview Judge W. W. McCredie, part owner of the Portland team, said:

"If the refusal of the Portland and Salt Lake players to accept cuts in their salaries forces the California clubs of the Coast league to drop us from the circuit, Portland, at least, will seek admittance to the Northwestern league for the period of the war, and, if I am not mistaken, the Salt Lake club will do the same thing."

"If we are forced to go into the Northwestern league with our ball club, we will also be forced to observe the Northwestern league salary limit, which is \$2,500 for the team. This will enable the Portland and Salt Lake clubs to get thru the season without further loss of thousands of dollars."

"This situation has been forced on the Coast league club owners by the war, and it is no threat to make our players accept cuts from contracts. If they do not do so, we are given entrance into the Northwestern league, and they would wel-
