The Woman's Army Against Waste SIMPLIFY YOUR MEALS

For housewives in war time there is no better motto than the simple word with its simple significance—"Simplify!" Apply the word to every act, to every idea, to every plan you make about the household. By simplifying your meals, you will be patriotic in more than one way—you will be saving food to feed the soldier and you will be saving your own time to give to whatever phase of war work you have pledged yourself to do.

"How can I change the family habits of eating now when all the tempting fresh vegetables and fruits are coming on the market? They are so tantalizingly good to look at that I can't resist them in the markets," said a conscientious woman to me the other day.

"Did you ever try serving a meal of uncooked foods occasionally? Give your family a rest and a change now and then. You might also make it a rule to cut down on the varieties of food served at a meal and also to adopt the three-course dinner," I answered.

"If your food is well cooked and daintily served and you put novelty into your selection the family will welcome the simple meal. Besides hunger is the best appetizer known. Wartime is a good time to adopt one of the maxims for which Horace Fletcher became famous. Never eat except when you are so hungry that the thought of food makes your mouth water. Try it for a while."



MAY USE SHERIFF



Q—Perhaps you will be kind enough to inform me what redress a landlord has when a tenant refuses to pay his rent. I have been told that if you get the sheriff to put them out they can turn around and sue you for damages. Is this true?

I have read in the newspapers various cases where the landlord tried to get rid of undesirable tenants, but the tenant always manages to come out on top in any of the court proceedings which resulted.

What means do you know of whereby a property owner can get what is justly due from tenants who have no bank account or property, but who spend all their earnings for appearances and high living?

A—If a tenant owes his landlord back rent and refuses to pay it, the property owner may solicit the services of the sheriff in having them removed from his premises and said tenant has no redress. If the tenant is employed, his salary may be garnished for the debt.

CORNSTARCH BEADS

Q—I have heard there is a way to make beads of salt and cornstarch. I believe they are called cornstarch beads. Have you the directions for making?

MARY W.
A—For cornstarch beads use 2 tablespoons of cornstarch, 2 tablespoons salt, 2 tablespoons rose toilet water or perfume, 2 tablespoons of hot water. Add coloring until the shade desired is obtained. Cook beads. String on a hat pin until dry. This mixture does not shrink as the rose petals do, so make the beads the size desired.

Q—Will you kindly inform me as to the proper way one should respond to a birth announcement?

HOW TO CLEAN HAT
Q—I want to fix up my last summer's panama and get some wear out of it this year. Can you tell me how to clean it?

IRENE.
A—Subject it to good scrubbing with Castile soap and warm water; use a nail brush to get the dirt away. Place in the hot sun to dry, and in the course of two or three hours it will be ready for use. A little glycerine added to the rinsing water entirely prevents the stiffness and brittleness acquired by some hats in drying, while a little ammonia in the wash water materially assists in the scrubbing process. Ivory or in fact any good white soap will do as well as Castile. It is well to rinse a second time, adding the glycerine to the water, moving it about to get rid of traces of the dirty water. When the hat has been thoroughly rinsed, press out surplus water. Use a Turkish bath towel for the purpose, and let it rest on the towel when drying.

Q—I have been married for five years and haven't been living with my wife for over three years and a half. I am 22 now, being only 17 when I was married. The ceremony was performed in Canada, but I am an American citizen. Can I obtain a divorce in this city without my wife being here? I don't know where she is. The last time I heard from her was two years ago.

A—If you have resided in the state for one year, you may start suit for a divorce, regardless of whether your wife is here.

SPEECH PROPER

Q—After an entertainment I attended with a friend, she introduced me to two ladies, both teachers. We all took the same car and transferred. I was the first to leave and before saying "Good-bye" I said "I am pleased to have met you."

FOR TIRED FEET
