REGISTERED MEN MUST APPLY TO PROPER BOARD

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 17.—Did you register for the select army? If so, you have a number of things still to do and to do at once. Remember, it is UP TO YOU. Do not wait for the mails to bring you any notice or directions.

What exemption district do you live in? If you do not know, find out.

Where does your exemption board have its office? Go there and ask for copies of blanks and forms. You have some to fill out.

What is your number? Go to the board's office and find out.

Then watch the papers for news from Washington as to the "drawing." The numbers are all to be put in a wheel or into something to be drawn by lot.

Don't Wait for Letter

In this lottery your number will either be drawn or not drawn; then the lucky number will be posted at the headquarters of the board, and published in The Star. Anyway, it is up to you to watch the bulletin board or to read your paper and find out whether your number has been drawn.

You may get a letter notifying you that you are drawn, but DO NOT WAIT FOR THE LETTER; watch the bulletin board and the newspaper.

Must Ask Exemption

Your local board will next examine all men whose numbers are drawn, to determine whether they are physically fit.

You must present yourself for this examination, whether you think you are fit or not; even if you have only one leg, do not neglect to present yourself. You are not excused until you have been examined and the board gives you a written certificate to that effect.

The same is true as to exemption for other causes. It is up to you, you are NOT EXEMPTED until you have set out these facts on one of the official forms and had it made into an affidavit before a notary public and then presented this affidavit to the exemption board. Those entitled under the law to exemption, must go thru the same forms as those seeking exemption on the fact of disability.

If you have a dependent mother, this fact must be set out on one of the official forms and sworn to and the affidavit filed within seven days after you are called before the board.

If proof is required, you may have to get an affidavit of two neighbors, householders, and file this with the board within the next ten days following the first seven days.

There's a Chance for Appeal

What will happen after you have filed your claim for exemption? Your various affidavits will be determined by the exemption board. After all, these boards have the say.

WHERE SEATTLE'S REGISTERED MEN CAN FIND DRAFT NUMBERS

Lists showing the serial numbers of registered men in all 12 districts of the city may be seen at the comptroller's office, in the County City building. A special staff of clerks, aided by policemen, is on hand to lend men assistance in determining the numbers which will be used to select the members of the new army.

In addition to being in the comptroller's office, some of the lists are posted in other places.

The lists for district 4 are at 41 Haller building and at the Queen Anne library. Telephone information will be given at the library.

The lists for district 8 are at room 417 in the County City building, as well as in the comptroller's office, in the same building.

The lists for district 11 may also be seen at the county clerk's office, while those for district 12 are at the Alaska and California ave. fire station and at the county treasurer's office.

MICHAELIS, NEW CHANCELLOR, TO AIM FOR UNITY

BERLIN, July 16.—via London, July 17.—Chancellor Geo. Michaelis' program is to be a strong policy without unity within.

Highest sources gave this outline of the premier's fundamental theories today.

Berlin is keenly anxious to hear the new chancellor formally set forth his aims and policies. It was announced today that reassembling of the reichstag for a meeting, at which the new premier would make his maiden speech, might be possible by Thursday.

Without Opinion

Until the new chancellor formally states his policies, the Berlin press will continue cautious about giving him support or voicing opinion, according to indications today.

All newspapers concede Michaelis' strength of character. But the socialist organs and socialist party members were particularly reticent about expressing an opinion as to him.

Meantime the Junkeristic press is pursuing its condemnation of former Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg with unprecedented vigor and hatred.

Kaiser Regrets Move

Most reichstag leaders today professed the belief that the Kaiser was sincere in the regret over Hollweg's retirement, voiced in his letter accepting the premier's resignation. They pointed out that the emperor appreciated the support of the war by the socialists and workmen's parties was largely due to Hollweg's efforts.

A number of conservative leaders declared the Kaiser only accepted Hollweg's retirement when the premier's indecision between reaction and liberalism was apparent, and when it seemed best to take this course to avoid an open break.

Without Backbone

Hollweg was held by these elements to have alienated the liberals at the last. But today even the party members were charitably inclined toward the former chancellor, attributing his efforts as being impelled by the best intentions, but directed without backbone.

Hollweg is freely credited by liberals with accomplishment of electoral reform in Prussia.
