# LIBERTY STRIKING CARMEN ANSWER COMPANY

The following reply of the striking carmen to the Traction company's formal refusal to permit its employees to deal with it collectively:

"The statement of the Traction company, issued in this morning's paper, is so absolutely silly and its weakness so obvious, that it scarcely merits a reply. However, there are among the good people of the city those who give these matters but superficial consideration, and since it is those to whom the company appeals, we must administer the antidote.

**How About Fraternal Orders?**  
"The company walks out the message to our citizens that when the employees of the Traction company join the Street Car Men's union they take an obligation to that organization and do not pledge themselves to support the constitution and laws of the state and nation."

"The same may be said of hundreds of fraternal organizations, too, but that does not make them bad citizens. At the proper time and place, and like members of fraternal societies, they have sworn allegiance to their great state and nation and the strict observance of the law, and as good citizens, resent the insinuation that there is anything within their constitution which is not in absolute harmony with the text and spirit of the constitution of the state and nation.

**Labor Has Legal Rights**  
"Every one of the thirteen unions involved in this controversy is affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, which organization has been recognized by President Wilson and congress as a most valuable asset to the nation and an agency thru and by which great accomplishments have been achieved. "All of these organizations are subject to discipline by the Central Labor Council of Seattle and the American Federation of Labor, and by doing business with them, instead of fighting them, the company's experience would be that of other corporations, that much better team work and greatly increased efficiency among the men would result.

**Greater Than Constitution**  
"When this corporation, in an age of modernized industry, says to its employees, 'You shall not be permitted to organize,' as it is saying today, and which is the only issue before us, it sets itself up as something greater than the constitution of the United States, over which it professes so much concern, and which guarantees to every citizen the right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. "Ten thousand members of this organization have already enlisted in the army, and 2,000 have been either killed or wounded fighting on the side of the allies.

**Want Democracy at Home**  
"Many of the company's employees have volunteered for the front, and many more will be drafted. Imagine the embarrassment of these noble men,

if confronted by some Russian peasant or other humble ally, who would say: 'What! You came 8,000 miles to fight for liberty, justice and democracy, when you are denied at home the simple right to organize? How very foolish to come all this distance to fight for something you do not enjoy in your own country!' What reply can this noble patriot make?"

In the reception room of the company's offices at the Stuart building, hangs a beautiful placard upon which is pictured the Stars and Stripes, and under which is printed in bold type, these words: "I pledge allegiance to my flag, and the republic for which it stands; one nation indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

"What a travesty, in this particular place under the peculiar conditions. Surely, the company has never thought as deeply or from the same viewpoint as the vast majority of our citizens upon this question.

**Strikers Want Rights**  
"We desire harmony in our industrial relations, but the citizens of this great commonwealth might just as well make up their minds right now that, regardless of the outcome of this strike, there never can be the proper spirit or team work, as between employer and employee, so long as that employer, as in case of Puget Sound Traction, Light & Power Co., takes to itself the right to organize in the Metal Trades' association and the Employers' association, and absolutely denies the right to his employee to organize if he so elects.

"This is the issue, and the only issue. No question is ever settled until it is settled right, and since the public has such a vital interest in the final settlement of this question, it should see to it that it is settled immediately, and settled right.

## WOMEN WOULD FIGHT TEUTONS

WASHINGTON, July 18.—An American girls' "legion of love" may join Russia's female "regiment of death" and Britain's "woman's army" on the European battle front.

Formal application to recruit a legion from Uncle Sam's 50,000,000 women and girls has been filed with Secretary of War Baker, by the Young Women's Christian Association. Thousands of college and society girls are ready to serve.

Food conservation, rolling Red Cross bandages and similar "home war" duties are well enough, the girls feel, but they point out that both England and Russia have uniformed and officered forces of women close to the fighting lines, and they want to be there, too.

For example, the British "women's army," about 30,000 strong, is acting in an auxiliary capacity to the men battling on the front lines. They are quartered by regular regiments, close behind the big guns, and are accredited as part of the active British field forces.

"Legion of love" want to be official part of the American expeditionary force in France, but would perform slightly different military duties.

According to the Y. W. C. A. idea, the women troops would be coordinated with the Y. M. C. A. field force, which is spending millions of dollars for relief and comfort work, for Pershing's Sammies.

Working out details of this proposed legion is in the hands of a special committee of the International Y. W. C. A.



# What Caused the Street Car Strike

Here Are Some Facts the Public Should Know and Which Should Not Be Lost Sight Of:

There is a clause in our franchise to protect the public against loss of service in a crisis like this.

That clause provides for arbitration of wages and hours of service between company and employees.

Demands made upon us June 21 were for increased wages and shorter hours for trainmen.

On June 23 we entered into an agreement to arbitrate with a committee representing the men. They named their member of the arbitration board, and we named ours.

On July 3, without waiting for arbitration, demands were presented from employees other than trainmen, and we issued a public statement that we depended upon arbitration.

On July 14 still further demands were made with the suggestion that we agree to conciliation, but that if this were not satisfactory, the men were willing that the whole matter be submitted to arbitration.

On July 16, while we were still depending upon arbitration in accordance with the agreement made, the men issued an ultimatum demanding that President Leonard personally enter the Tacoma strike situation on behalf of the strikers there, and that this company recognize the union here, with a sympathetic walkout as the immediate alternative.

The men abandoned arbitration after agreeing to it. So Seattle walks because seven Tacoma men lost their jobs.
