Bar Real Bull Fights

MEXICO CITY, July 20.—Real bull fights now are prohibited in Mexico by decree of President Carranza. Recently contests in which the bull is not killed, known as "novilladas," have been sanctioned. These have not been particularly popular with the bull-fight enthusiasts.

A delegation of Mexican society women interested in Red Cross work called on Gen. Carranza recently and requested that he sanction a contest for the benefit of the Red Cross, in which the bull would be killed.

They explained that it was feared that if only denatured performances were advertised, the receipts would not greatly swell the treasury of the Red Cross. Gen. Carranza declined to comply with the request.

Incredible as it may seem, it is nevertheless true that Gladys Brockwell, the William Fox emotional star, cried like a baby the first time she ever appeared on the stage.
