TRAGEDY WILL END IN TRIAL OF KORNILOFF

BY WM. G. SHEPHERD United Press Staff Correspondent STOCKHOLM, Sept. 29.—The court-martial of Gen. Korniloff will probably result in a tragedy.

Korniloff is to be judged by those whose scheme of making the army subject to civilian control stung him to revolt. Men under the domination of the soviet, or all-Russian council of workmen and soldiers, will constitute the court-martial to try the former commander-in-chief. It was the soviet influence which Korniloff, the soldier, the fighter, the man unskilled in politics, feared was crumbling Russia's army away. The soviet hates Korniloff. One of the main reasons why Korniloff attempted to overthrow the government of Premier Kerensky was the provisional government's appointment, at the dictation of the soviet, of 30 "commissaries," who went to the front representing the government, and who possessed more authority than the generals of the army themselves. The "commissaries" were all civilians, and frequently they were all politicians.

Protect Soldiers The commissaries protected the soldiers against their superior army commanders. Russian officers invariably called them Kerensky's spies. Army commanders were compelled to submit their military plans to the judgment of the commissaries.

With one army the commissary was Kerensky's nephew—a youth in the 20s. He had the final word over all the troops there. He lived like a lord. Limousines were at his disposal. He felt his power and he exercised it. He always protected the soldiers against their officers. Korniloff saw this system's workings. Stern disciplinarian that he was, he decided it was impossible to lead an army so formed and controlled. He held it the most grotesque system in history.

Thought It Patriotic It was unthinkable in his view that an army so weakened by discipline and so controlled by civilians who knew nothing of strategy could ever protect Russia in her new-found freedom.

Therefore Korniloff revolted. It was his idea of patriotism for his country, to save the nation from such an army's disintegration.

I was in Petrograd during these developments, and can attest the untruth of the statement that allied citizens there were against Korniloff.

He Was Their Hope On the contrary, he represented to them a new hope of a reinvigorated Russia. They rejoiced as bulleting told of Korniloff's army's approach toward the city.

Not even the possibility of a bloody battle in the streets deterred the individual, that a new Russian army might be born.

Foreigners in Petrograd all knew Korniloff could not restore the Romanoff. They did believe he might furnish an iron hand for Russia—develop into a man of the hour, like leaders have been developed in other countries, who could dominate.

Stockholm Optimistic If one desires optimism of Russia's revolution, he can obtain it in Stockholm. It is evident there is a concerted German propaganda drive to disarm the allies, and particularly America, to belief that everything is rosy in Russia.

Lithuanians Aren't Slavs or Teutons Dear Miss Grey: A short time ago I noticed a piece in your paper stating in substance that they are of the Russian race. Being myself a Lithuanian by birth, I wish to correct the erroneous impression about the race.

Lithuania, an ancient grand-duchy united with Poland in the 14th century, was originally three times as large as Poland. The Lithuanians are not Slavs, for they form a distinct linguistic class in the Indo-European family, and the Lithuanian language, which is much older than the Slavic, has a history strikingly resembling the original language of the Aryans, the archaic Sanskrit.

The greatness of Lithuania began with Rindigol in 1255, when he conquered a considerable part of Russian territory, with the assistance of his son, Mindaugas or Mindaugas. The Lithuanians of today, about 4,000,000 in number, dwell principally in the districts of Kovno, Vilna, Grodno and Suwalki and part of East Prussia. They are of the famous old Sanskrit tongue in Europe. They have their own past, traditions, songs, history; they are neither Teutons nor Slavs.

Lithuania, the battle grounds of Russia and Germany for the past three years, has been devastated by fire and sword. The people are in much greater distress and need than those of Belgium or Poland, but they have received the least assistance, as but very few people in America seem to know anything about the race.

TEACH KAISER WORSHIP THRU SCHOOL BOOKS

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Blind worship of the kaiser, blind obedience to the authoritative, blind belief in military glory, and the steady thought that France is the enemy—these are the things taught in Prussian schools.

History, geography, composition are all pressed into service to warp children into a certain mold. These facts make many who know Germany doubt whether President Wilson can drive a wedge between the kaiser and the German people.

They are strikingly brought out in a serious book to appear in the late fall. Singularly enough, it was not written as a war or propaganda book, but as a straight study of Prussian schools for American educators. Its title is "Prussian Elementary Schools" and its author is Thomas Alexander of George Peabody College for Teachers, Nashville, Tenn.

The German schools, this book shows, are steadily used to make the Germans ready and willing to take their place in that part of the social order in which they were born.

The result is a type of citizenship easily amenable to the orders of the bureaucracy. Love for the kaiser is steadily pumped into the children, who are told of the reforms of the ruling house for the lower classes.

In 1889, fearing the growth of socialist feeling, the kaiser himself ordered the schools should be used to combat this. The teachers were ordered to tell the children how the power of state alone could assure the individual his freedom and right, and to prove by statistics how conditions and wages had improved under royal protection.
