PLAN BIG TIME FOR THE THIRD SERVICE SQUAD

Seattle has planned an elaborate celebration for the third contingent of her select service men, who leave for Camp Lewis Thursday.

The parade, which will start promptly at 1 p. m., at Fourth ave. and Union st., will be preceded by a luncheon at the Hippodrome and a free show at the Moore theatre.

Managers Carl Letter, of the Moore, says the free show, which starts at 10:30, for the soldiers is to be a rip-snorter. "Lots of pep," he says.

The select service men will then go to Caspar Fisher's Hippodrome, where music and food will be dished out to them under the supervision of D. S. Tobias, Dan Landon and G. A. Grant.

R. L. Swezza, grand marshal of the parade, says that colored serpentine paper will be thrown across the path of the men. Several bands will be in the line of march. The "Good Cheer Pit Car" will bring up the rear.

This car, Swezza points out, will contain two Red Cross nurses, who will take contributions of money and tobacco for the contingent. He asks that every one be liberal.

Boy Scouts will carry placards denoting the different divisions and American flags.

Members of the city council, district exemption board, Spanish-American War Veterans, G. A. R.'s and the soldiers will march to martial airs furnished by five bands.

The line of march for the parade is as follows: West on Union st. to Third ave., thence north on Third ave. to Stewart st., turning west on Stewart st. to Second ave., where it will proceed south to the Union station.



Albert Bloss, jr., who has been chosen by Uncle Sam to help Maj. Gen. Pershing in France, has notified U. S. Attorney Thomas Kennedy that he does not propose to peel potatoes or do any other work when he arrives at Camp Lewis, October 5.
