METAL TRADES NAME TAYLOR TO WAGE CASE

James A. Taylor, business agent of the Machinists' union, will represent the Metal Trades council when the wage adjustment committee arrives in Seattle next week to attempt a settlement of the shipyard strike.

Taylor was appointed at a meeting last night of the 15 allied trades affiliated with the council.

The meeting lasted several hours. A number of resolutions pertaining to the strike were adopted, but attendants refused to divulge their nature.

Secretary A. E. Miller said there was nothing he could say, except that Representative Taylor would be in entire command of the trades council interests.

The strike situation was placed before the Tacoma unions, who had delegates at the meeting Tuesday night, with a view towards enlisting union men from that city to aid in the strike. Favorable action is expected as soon as the Tacoma unionists can hold a meeting, which is expected today.

Carpenters' Strike

The boycott on lumber, the one big issue at stake in the strike, was more firmly clinched last night when 800 union carpenters met in Eagles' hall and overwhelmingly voted to refuse to have anything to do with 10-hour lumber.

A long debate was held over the telegram received last week from W. L. Hutcheson, of Indianapolis, president of the Carpenters' union, which urged the Seattle carpenters to remain out of the strike.

The arguments were to the effect that the local carpenters were not on a strike, but were simply living up to the contract signed with the master builders. The general sentiment was that the carpenters were simply boycotting lumber and not striking.

U. S. DESTROYER DAMAGED BY BRITISH SHIP

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—An American destroyer operating in European waters was severely damaged in a night collision with a British naval vessel, the navy department announced today. After the accident the British ship stood by and took off part of the destroyer's crew, leaving her in port.

No one aboard either ship was injured, and the destroyer has since been repaired and returned to active service. An investigating board of naval officials found that the accident was due to the fact that the destroyer suddenly emerged from a heavy downpour of rain, which made her invisible almost up to the moment of the collision.

TEN KILLED IN CALIFORNIA FIRE

FILLMORE, Cal., Oct. 3.—Ten persons are known dead and several more missing are being sought from a forest fire which today is sweeping the Little Seape oil and mining region, six miles north of Fillmore. Property damage is estimated at \$500,000.

The bodies of all listed as dead have been found.
At daybreak today forest supervisors from Santa Barbara arrived and prepared to put a force of several hundred men into the field to stop the flames, which are attributed to incendiaries.

Thirty-two oil derricks, a gasoline plant and dozens of buildings have been consumed.
Fillmore is not in danger today from the fire, unless the wind veers.

CRISIS IMPENDS OVER EMBARGO ON NEUTRALS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—That important developments are pending affecting Scandinavia and Holland is the conviction in official circles today. Ever-increasing tightening of the allied embargo on shipments of supplies of all kinds to Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Holland is rapidly creating a situation which may have an important bearing on the war.

The complaint of these countries against the American embargo is growing louder. This, coupled with Great Britain's stopping shipments of all articles to Scandinavia and Holland, is expected to bring a crisis.

In Atlantic ports tons of grain for Holland and other neutrals are rotting and rotting in the vessels. Scores of ships are lying idle, and thousands of dollars are being lost as a result of allied refusal to let the grain and other products go.

There is a persistent rumor that Germany may try to seize Holland, particularly if the British continue against the Ostend-Zeebrugge bases becomes more acute, or if there should appear to be any suggestion of an allied coup of getting a foothold in Holland.

Meantime Scandinavia is a perplexing problem, with the chance that the pro-Swedish royalty may lead that nation into war on the side of the central powers.

AIRCRAFT BOARD IS AFTER DOUGLAS FIR

KERENSKY LOSES IN LONG FIGHT FOR COALITION

Yesterday the same conference voted, 766 to 688, in favor of a coalition of all parties in the formation of a cabinet which should firmly administer the Russian democracy.

The vote today came after the conference had formally decided to reconsider that decision.

Today's action by the congress is inexplicable, unless the Bolsheviks and anti-Kerensky forces seized upon a moment in the proceedings when the majority elements were absent to hurry thru a reconsideration of yesterday's vote, and then had sufficient strength to overthrow the previous vote sustaining Kerensky.
