

PLAY ZONE PLANNED

Sammy's at Lewis to Have a Gay Resort

 CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Oct. 18.—The government has placed an official boycott on the city that built itself out of soldiers' money around the gates of this camp, and is keeping every soldier out of it. But not for very long will Sammy be forced to keep his money and forego the pleasures of civilization.

Within a week construction will be started, it is thought now, on the great amusement zone that is to keep the soldiers supplied with fun.

Almost daily the citizens' committee of Tacoma men, which have charge of the matter—always under the watchful eye of Maj. Gen. H. A. Greene, commanding the camp, is meeting to consider the bids of those who would establish themselves within reach of Sammy's pocketbook.

Many Want Concessions
 Everyone, it would seem, wants concession of some kind or other. "Everybody in the world was in here this afternoon," said Capt. H. A. Welty, aide-de-camp to the general, yesterday, "and they all wanted concessions."

The citizens' committee will demand of every concessionaire suitable guarantees of honesty and financial backing, and will charge a small ground rent for the land, and, in addition, commandeer a certain percentage of the profits. What this percentage will be will differ with different businesses and will be set later.

To Call It Liberty Park
 The excess profits will be turned into a general fund and used for the benefit of the men. It may go into their mess funds or it may be used for library books, or the beautifying of the cantonment. The pleasure zone will be known

as "Liberty Park."
 There will be restaurants, a hotel for officers and their wives, moving picture theatres and vaudeville houses, and the usual collection of shooting galleries, bowling alleys, billiard halls and soft drink and tobacco stands.

The buildings, for the most part, will be of the same Spartan architecture of the cantonment—plain, tight structures.

Some of the bidders are willing to spend thousands of dollars on their concessions, and it is probable that the zone will represent an outlay of close to \$1,000,000 when it is in full running order.

CALLS LINCOLN NEGRO Physician Will Face Malicious Libel Charge

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 19.—That Abraham Lincoln had negro blood, was a traitor and the worst "tyrant" the country has ever seen, that he was an infidel, blasphemous, and a liar—these are a few of the charges Dr. Wilhelm T.  That Lincoln was a pronounced traitor to the United States during the Mexican war.
 That Wendell Phillips wrote Lincoln's replies to Stephen A. Douglas.
 That Lincoln drove the South out of the Union.
 That Lincoln was a rank infidel.
 That Lincoln was blasphemous.
 That Lincoln was blackballed three times in Masonry and would have joined a negro lodge in Wash-
