

# Looks as if Portland Will Come to N. W.

Seattle's hopes of having a baseball club in the Pacific Coast league in 1918 went flooey yesterday, following the announcement from the headquarters of the circuit in San Francisco that Portland is to be dropped next season.

Without Portland remaining in the league, there is but small chance for Seattle to horn into the larger circuit.

If the war continues until next April, there will be no Coast league, but a California league instead, with Sacramento and Fresno replacing Portland and Salt Lake.

This indicates that if Portland wants organized baseball next year it will have to come into the Northwestern league. The addition of Portland to this circuit would call for a higher rating and give the fans a much better brand of baseball.


The logical way out seems for California to have its league, the Northwest to have one composed

of Portland, Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane, while Salt Lake joins hands with the Montana cities and revives the old Union association.

There is little hope of Vancouver breaking into the Northwestern league under these conditions, although Bob Brown wants to try it again, a six-man city might be found where travelling team could be franchised.

Portland will be welcomed into the Northwestern league, but the baseball moguls must not overlook the fact that the Northwestern league is a back number as a Class B circuit. It must have a high standing in organized baseball. Class B ball will not draw in Portland, which has been used to having the A-A brand.

The local situation should be considerably improved by the new car service, which has been installed in Rainier valley. The poor car service of the past and the poorer streets for autos was one of the big drawbacks here during the past few years.

# Bowling Champs to Tour the Country

Jimmie Smith, world champion bowler, and "Count" John Gengler, perhaps the most artistic bowler in the country, will begin a coast-to-coast bowling tour late this fall, visiting all large cities.

The pair toured states east of the Mississippi last year, winning most of their matches and making a great impression.

Smith this year is going after a few more perfect scores to add to his present record of 15, said to be the most ever made by any bowler in a lifetime.

Gengler is particularly famous for his palm bowling and for picking holes off the Montana hills. Palm bowling was almost a lost art in America until the Luxemburg wonder came to America a few years ago and showed he was as proficient: bowling without using the holes in the ball as the average man was with his favorite sphere.

The two champions will start from New York in November and expect to be on the road until early spring.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Ted Lewis, welterweight champion, is Benny Leonard's next man, provided Benny's duties as army boxing instructor will let him polish off for the ring again.

Britton had the advantage of about six pounds' weight, but he had only one round of the whole fight. If Benny had not been anxious in the tenth and the final session, Britton would probably have joined Benny's long list of knockouts. As it was, Britton was in bad shape.


# Can UW Keep Its Record?
