Cynthia Grey's Answers to Her Readers' Questions

Dear Miss Grey: Would thank you sincerely if you would tell me what lodestone is and where it is obtained. A READER. Lodestone is a metallic deposit, usually having the character of an ore-producing vein—confined within walls and having something of regularity. The name is sometimes applied to any regular course or vein, metallic or otherwise.

Dear Miss Grey: Please advise me how I can get rid of an oily nose. It looks so bad that I have to rub it with a handkerchief every hour to take the oil out. What is the cause of this? LAURA. An oily skin is usually caused from an over-indulgence in food containing a large amount of fat. Put a few drops of camphor in the water you rinse your face in. Also avoid using any greasy creams or skin food. Rub the nose a number of times a day with a good chamomis skin.

Dear Miss Grey: Is there any way to cut chicken fat home so it will keep? FAIRMER'S WIFE. Yes. Cut chicken first into suitable pieces, boil until tender and pack in glass jars surrounded by boiling water. This meat jelly, or "aspic," in which they have been cooked, is then seasoned to taste and poured over the pieces, boiling hot, until the jar is filled to the brim, and the jars sealed while hot. The addition of the aspic, which is melted when the cans are sealed, but which solidifies on cooling, not only assists in preserving the meat, but improves its flavor.

Dear Miss Grey: I have been going with a young man for more than a year. He has given me good times and taken me where I have met nice people. But during all this time he has never said he cares for me. Most of the young men who have called on me for any length of time have told me how much they liked me, and remarked about my clothes and good looks. This man never says anything of the kind. WOODEN MULES BEING USED IN DRILL AT LEWIS

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Nov. 9.—Wooden mules and wooden guns may be found side by side at Camp Lewis, but the dummy burros do not draw the dummy guns.

The mules are used at Remount depot to teach recruits the proper method of throwing a diamond hitch and loading a pack saddle. The living government mule has several tricks, and one of the most amusing is his custom of expanding himself when the pack rope is cinched and then "deflating" when the recruit thinks it is tight. 
