Leo Houck Wants to Get Another Battle With Title Claimer

LEO HOUCK, Seattle lightweight, takes his pen in hand to dash off a few lines in answer to "Butch" Erb's letter reads: "In reply to Mr. Erb's claims printed in The Star, whereby he claims the Northwest lightweight title for his protégé, George Ingle, will state that I desire to meet George at the lightweight requirements—133 pounds ring-side—at some future show to be held in Seattle."

"It is the unanimous opinion of the boxing fans who attended the recent Moose show that I bested Frankie Farren, who had knocked out Alex Trambitas, sensational Northwest lightweight."

"It is true that Ingle won a six-round decision from me the night following the Farren contest, but I claim I was not at my best, being somewhat stiff and sore from my fight of the night before. I do not mean to take credit from George, however, for his record shows he has been one of the best lightweights on the Coast for years."

Ingle is making his first start in defending his claims to the Northwest title Friday night when he takes on Mike Pete in a four-round bout at the Crystal Pool.

Pete, since his win over Pete Mische, the highly-touted Portlander, has been recognized as owning a place among the topnotch lightweights of the Northwest. While Ingle is figured to be a bit too rough for the Wilkeson miner, we would not be surprised to see the two stage a mighty tough fracas, with the going about 50-50.

WHAT NEXT? WE'VE BASEBALL AND BOXING ON ICE—WILL THEY START TO SWIM NEXT?



Absolutely the latest in winter sports. We have had baseball on ice, golf on ice and tennis on ice, but never have ice skaters been so enthusiastic that they would don eight-ounce mitts and stage a regular boxing match.

Yet this is just what these two athletes have done. Boxing on ice differs somewhat from the ring game. A 40-foot ring is provided, instead of the conventional 24-foot squared circle used in regular boxing. This is so the boxers will have more space to maneuver in.

Then some of the boxing rules which prevent wrestling are abolished in ice boxing. The lower picture shows how one of the boxers, in making a short turn, has almost shouldered the other. This is a sort of an ice-boxing clinch, and neither man is allowed to hit while in this position.
