2 CHINESE DISCLAIM OPIUM FOUND HIDDEN

Chi Wau Son and John Ho, arraigned before U. S. District Judge Jeremiah Netzer, Friday on charges of smuggling opium, claim they are innocent victims.

Chi Wau Son, arrested at Bellingham in January for transporting 45 five-tael cans of opium, said he was the innocent messenger of other parties. However, he pleaded guilty and was fined \$500 and costs.

John Ho said he went to a Chinese doctor for treatment and that the doctor lied upon hearing the officers coming, leaving him to be arrested for having opium in the room. He, too, pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 and costs.

AMERICAN INDIANS TO FIGHT FOR DEMOCRACY

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Wearing the uniforms of khaki and blue, many thousands of bronze-faced American Indian fighters will for the first time in the history of the race engage in modern European warfare side by side with their American "pale-faced" neighbors.

Government reports show that a large number of Indians, in keeping with their tribal fighting traditions, have enlisted in the American forces since the declaration of war.

Up to date, American Indians have purchased almost \$8,000,000 of the first and second issues of the Liberty Loan Bonds.

Postpone Improvements Until War Has Ceased

The hearing on the paving of Boyer ave. has been postponed 43 weeks, according to a decision of the city council committee on streets and sewers Thursday. The action was taken in accordance with the policy to delay all municipal improvements not absolutely necessary until the close of the war.

INJURED WHEN BIKE OVERTURNS

George Pinto, 24, a Western Union messenger, suffered serious injuries about the face and head, including possibly a fractured skull, when the motorcycle on which he was riding skidded and overturned on 14th and Madison about 7:15 Friday morning.

His head struck the steel rail of the car track with such force that he was knocked insensible. He was discovered a few minutes later by C. A. G. Hedlund, an inspector for the Puget Sound Traction, Light & Power Co., who secured an auto and brought the youth to the city hospital. He had not recovered consciousness up to a late hour Friday.

Marconi Wireless Stations Are Ordered Dismantled

SAN FRANCISCO, March 8.—The big wireless stations of the Marconi Co. at Bolinas and Marshall have been dismantled by the marines under orders from the navy department.

The wireless equipment was sent to Vallejo. The stations will not be operated until the end of the war, according to navy department officials.

PHILADELPHIA, March 8.—The largest service flag in the country will fly from the city hall, here, if present plans are carried through. Policemen and Boy Scouts are now engaged in taking a census of the city to determine the exact number of Philadelphians in the United States and Allied services. It is estimated that the number will total at least 50,000.
