LAW'S STRONG ARM WILL NOT REACH OUT FOR JACK SHUKIS

In February, Palonia Shukis' husband, Jack, went to Portland. He left without warning, didn't even say good-bye.

Behind him, in Columbia, he left a wife who spoke not a word of English. With her were five little children. They were poor, with the heart-rending poverty that only the emigrant can know. The future did not count in their scheme of things, they were much too busy eking out an existence from day to day.

Asks for Help
When Jack Shukis went away, he left his wife and babies behind, without money, food or fuel.

The neighbors stepped into the breach, and have provided the little group with the necessities of life, and the county has paid for their support \$10 every month.

Saturday morning Mrs. Shukis came to the prosecuting attorney's

office. With her came a countryman who could speak a bit of English. Between them they told the story to Deputy Prosecutor Lane Summers.

Law Won't Aid
"He is in Portland, we think," they said. "You get him. You bring him back." And they beamed with childlike faith.

But the prosecuting attorney cannot "bring him back." The government of this state does not provide money to bring back deserting husbands who have gone to other states.

Only murderers and forgers and those who make life unsafe for their fellows are caught by the strong arm of the law when they step beyond the boundaries of Washington. Mrs. Shukis could not understand why she was refused, but the refusal hurt. With saddened, hopeless face, she left the office to go back to the desolation of the little home.

RED CROSS ASKS FOR SPHAGNUM

An order was received Friday for 500,000 sphagnum moss dressings by J. W. Hotson, director of moss work for the Red Cross. The dressings must be ready by July 1, as a result of urgent demands from the hospitals at the front.

Mr. Hotson is assistant professor of botany at the University of Washington. He plans to form new auxiliaries in sphagnum moss districts in order to supply the order.

Large quantities of the moss, which has great healing and absorbent qualities, can be procured from Alaska. Mr. Hotson expects to go North to locate moss beds. Moss pads are cheaper than cotton, and will absorb from 10 to 20 times their weight in moisture without becoming soggy.

BELIEVE PACKWOOD SITE IS TOO SMALL

Councilmen Erickson and Lane went to Cedar Falls Saturday to inspect the sealing work, which has been resumed on the city's water basin.

They returned Friday night from an inspection of the Packwood lake power site. Both expressed the opinion that this site would not produce enough power to compare favorably with other sites.

ANYHOW, KAISER BELIEVES KARL

AMSTERDAM, April 12.—Kaiser William has telegraphed Emperor Karl the following, according to a dispatch from Vienna:

"Accept my heartfelt thanks for your statement repudiating the French premier's assertion. I hasten to assure you that not for a moment have I doubted that you have made our cause yours.

"Our enemies, unable to prevail honorably, resort to the lowest and most sordid methods. It is our duty to grapple ruthlessly and beat them in all war theaters."

GOOSE-STEPPED; LANDS IN JAIL AS SPY SUSPECT

SAN FRANCISCO, April 12.—A suggestion of the goose step in the stride of Walter Peters aroused the suspicion of a neighbor in Crockett, with the result that Peters today is in jail. The U. S. marshal says Peters is one of the "best" German spies in the business.

Peters admits that he was on the German cruiser Leipzig when British warships sunk her off the Falklands. He reached a South American port and from there reported to a German consul in a Mexican west coast city. From Mexico he came to California, registered for the draft as a Danish subject and took out his first papers.

Valuable information was seized in Peters' room, according to Sheriff Veale, of Contra Costa county. Carefully hidden copies of reports to the German consul in Mexico, reports on shipping and shipbuilding, diagrams of the harbors and defenses of Puget Sound and San Francisco, and a diary of the activities of the Leipzig were among the documents found.

NAVY YARD CALLS FOR AN ARMY OF WORKMEN

From the Puget Sound navy yard has come an appeal for workmen. Maximum wages will be paid to all laborers, helpers and mechanics for ten days after employment. They then will be re-rated upon the basis of ability.

The navy yard must have immediately 79 laborers, 8 helpers, boiler-maker, 19 general helpers, 13 boiler-makers, 4 boatbuilders, 23 boiler-makers, 4 calkers and chippers, 44 machinists, 90 machinists experienced in marine machine work, 21 shipsmiths and 1 toolmaker. Wages range from \$5.64 to \$13.60 a day.

Civil service examinations need not be taken in the state or territory in which the applicants reside, during the period of the war. Only those who have resided in one state or territory for at least a year are eligible for permanent appointment to the apportioned departmental service in Washington, D. C.

ALL CITIES ARE TRYING COMMERCIAL ECONOMY

Seattle is not alone in her efforts at commercial economy, according to E. F. Dahm, head of the commercial economy committee of the State Council of Defense. He says that every city in the Union is active along commercial saving lines.

"A MUNITIONS PLANT IN EVERY BACK YARD"

TAXICAB STRIKE FINALLY ENDS
Service was resumed by the Seattle Taxicab & Transfer Company shortly after noon Saturday, after being suspended since 7 a. m. Sunday.
A satisfactory settlement with the 14 drivers who went on strike for wage increase was announced Saturday noon by Neal H. Begley, vice president of the company.
Concessions were made by both sides, he said. Representatives of the drivers and the company have held daily conferences all week, and finally came to terms Friday night.
Eight women are among the drivers.
They demanded an increase from \$3.25 to \$4. The company said it could not meet the increase, and suspended service. The settlement involves a saving plan for the drivers, in addition to the wage question, Begley said.


