PERRY M'GILLIVRAY RETAINS HIS TITLE

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—Perry McGillivray, of the Illinois Athletic club, defeated a field of eight competitors in the annual 100-yard indoor swimming race sanctioned by the Amateur Athletic Union. He made the distance in 55.2 seconds, retaining the American championship.

Norman Ross, of San Francisco, finished five feet behind McGillivray. Angleworm Best Bait in Spring Fish Long for Real Meals After Hungry Winter

It is not believed there is a better lure for the large-mouth than the small green frog, nor a better one for the small-mouth than the soft shell cray-fish, the in the early season the angleworm makes a good all-around standby. The muscallunge and the pike-perch, the pickerel and the grass fish, all prefer the live minnow in the spring, while the crappie, perch, and other pond fish fare very nicely on the angleworm. Later in the season all fish from trout down to crappie can be taken more or less satisfactorily on the man-made or artificial lures.

Two Women After Title Now Held By Miss Bjursted

One of them, Mrs. Johan Rogge, is a country-woman of the wonderful Norwegian girl and the other, Miss Eleanor Goss, is one of the real sensations of the tennis world. Miss Bjursted must defend both her clay court and her grass court titles this year and the opposition of these two stars will not be trivial by any means. At the indoor game recently Miss Goss gave Miss Bjursted one of the hardest games of her career, taking the first set and forcing the Norse meteor to extend herself to the limit to take the third set. June 17 these three stars will meet in the national women's championship at the Philadelphia Cricket club and July 1 the national clay court matches will be held at the South Side Tennis club, of Chicago. Miss Bjursted's great driving at track has been fully met by the powerful game of Miss Goss. In their last match Miss Goss lost the last two sets on account of inaccuracy in placing her drives, rather than because she could not meet the Norwegian's game. Mrs. Rogge has not been so fortunate against Miss Bjursted, having lost two matches to the champion in straight sets.
