TO PROVIDE U. S. ADMINISTRATOR TO CURB RENTS

Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, July 11.—Passage of the rent profiteering bill introduced in congress thru the efforts of The Seattle Star and associated members of The Newspaper Enterprise association, will be the most effective means of stopping profiteering in rents by unscrupulous landlords.

This seems to be the opinion of the men who have been studying the problem of how to prevent the land hoogs from milking the public in war profits on rents.

Authorities on housing connected with the National Housing association, members of congress and the men in the government departments who are studying the rent profiteering problem, were inclined to believe that legislation might be necessary creating a national rent administration, with powers somewhat similar to those of Controller Garfield of the coal administration and Herbert Hoover of the food administration.

Classification Difficult Some landlords, owning a great deal of property, say they have repairs made on long term contracts at the lowest figure; another landlord, owning a single piece of property in the same locality, must pay the highest market rate for his repairs.

Every tenant whose rent has been raised since the United States entered the war might be expected to file a complaint with the rent administrator, because he could not be sure that the increase was justified. And the local rent administrator would be faced with the problem of determining whether the increase was justified or not.

Allow for Increase. Consideration of these difficulties has led officials to consider other means, and the rent profiteering bill is the result. It proposes to tax at the rate of 100 per cent all rents charged in excess of the pre-war basis (over and under September 30, 1918) plus 5 per cent allowance for increased costs of repairs, etc. It makes the landlord file returns with the collector of internal revenue and if he fails to do so, a 50 per cent penalty is added to the tax.

She's Thankful For Loving Care

Dear Miss Grey: I was greatly shocked by the letter from M. M. M., who concludes with, "I can never trust the people who lied to me, saying they were my parents, and taking the joy of having a girl on themselves, when all they were doing was using a little money."

When she is older she will understand that it takes more than "a little money" to bring up a child, but even so, she ought to have heart enough in her to appreciate a girl giving her a good home, and caring for her as they evidently have done. There has been much discussion about whether it is best to tell children whether they have been adopted or not. As an adopted child, I can say it is best for them not to know if it can be kept from them finally, for there is a certain odium that attaches to being an adopted child, that works a hardship on the child when it is small.

They appear to be in a different class from children living with their own parents. It always seemed to me that for people to adopt a child and pass it off for their own, was the very acme of humane and noble impulse, and I am very much surprised that there should be so much discussion or objection to it. People who bring up their own children have no choice in the matter, but for people who are free from the cares of a family, to decide deliberately to take the responsibility of bringing up children with all the attendant tasks of ingratiation and self-interest, and while the mother suffers in losing her children, it should not be counted against the good people who took care of the children, for the mother would certainly prefer, if she ever does find them, to know that they have been adopted, and she will appreciate the care if the child does not.

In regard to the mother who wishes to seek her child after 20 years, I doubt as to the quality of mother love which could wait 20 years for fulfillment. It may be that I am wrong, but I think from such love to the foster mother who had given her the care and earned the right to the child's love, but in any case, if the child does not know that she was adopted, it would be a great blow to her to find it out.

In my own case, my parents died when I was 4 years old and I was adopted by my aunt, whom I called mother. I knew I was adopted, and the I was treated kindly. I always knew that I was an adopted child, but I am thankful that I also realized that my own lot was so much better than my poor brothers and sisters, that I never ceased to be thankful to them for the haven they gave me; and when a case comes up, I always urge giving credit to people who adopt children, and would recommend that the child be kept from the knowledge that they are adopted until they come to years of discretion, which is quite late with some people. He declared, however, that the price fixing policy will be continued, because of the shortages existing in nearly every commodity.

Spruce Supply in Northwest Ample

SAN FRANCISCO, July 11.—Of 11,000,000,000 feet of spruce standing in Oregon and Washington, three billion feet is worth cutting. Eighteen per cent of that three billion feet is suitable for airplane stock. The United States therefore has 540,000,000 feet of good spruce airplane stock in the Pacific Northwest. These are some of the details outlined to the Ad clubs of the world today by Chas. F. Berg, of Portland, president of the Pacific Coast Ad Men's association.

Under Col. Disque, of the spruce division of the army, this spruce is being cut at the rate of 30,000,000 feet a month, Berg said.


