## Shipyard and Waterfront News & Notes

### SMITH COVE TO BE DOUBLED IF PLANS GO THRU

Definite plans for the enlargement and improvement of the Seattle port commission's Smith cove dock facilities, involving a direct expenditure of \$1,500,000, are being rapidly completed.

At Wednesday's meeting of the port commission, an estimate, roughly calculated, of \$1,500,000, was submitted to the commission by Port Engineer G. F. Nicholson, who was authorized to at once proceed with specifications for the proposed improvements, to be submitted at the next meeting of the commission.

At this time, the commission will probably decide to submit the proposition to the voters. Spokane and Hanford street improvement projects will probably not be undertaken for some time.

The Smith cove improvements will include a practical duplication of the present terminus, with a waterway of 1,100 feet. Berthing space, that at present accommodates seven big ocean freighters, will be able to hold from five to six additional. The Smith cove would then be the largest dock on the Pacific coast.

The material dredged from the channel will be used in filling in Elliott and Railroad aves. in the vicinity of the dock. A resolution was adopted at Wednesday's meeting authorizing the fill, with the provision that the port defray half the expense and the city the other half. The proposition will be submitted to the city council by Councilmen Thomson, Lane, Moore, City Engineer Dimock and Superintendent of Streets Case, who were at the meeting.

Increased salaries to the port engineer and auditor were voted at the meeting, and a report submitted by Port Manager Hamilton Higday on his return from San Francisco filed.

### Predicts Fleet of 25,000,000 Tons After War

In an after-dinner speech, at the conclusion of the repeat prepared in his honor at the Hotel Washington by Seattle's representative business men Wednesday night, John H. Rosseter, recently appointed director general of operations of the emergency fleet corporation, predicted a merchant fleet of 25,000,000 tons for America at the conclusion of the war.

"The American flag will dominate commerce when the war is over," Rosseter declared. "And the Pacific coast will be far and away ahead of the other shipping sections of the nation."

J. D. Lowman, Capt. J. F. Blain, district officer of the emergency fleet corporation; Judge R. A. Ballinger, Secretary G. C. Corbaley, of the Chamber of Commerce, and President A. J. Rhodes, of the chamber, delivered brief addresses.

Rosseter was scheduled to leave Seattle Thursday afternoon, proceeding thru Tacoma and Portland on his way to San Francisco to discontinue his steamship holdings for the duration of the war, in order to devote himself fully to his new duties as director general.

### INSTALL ENGINES IN FIRST LAKE VESSEL

The Meacham & Babcock Shipbuilding Co., at Ballard, is at work on the steamer Osprey Thursday, installing engines and boilers in the Lake Washington vessel launched by the Anderson Shipbuilding Co., at Houghton. The Osprey was towed by two tugs from Houghton, passing under the Latona bridge, and thru the canal locks late Wednesday afternoon. It is the first large seagoing vessel constructed on Lake Washington to navigate the canal.

### MASTERS AND MATES PROCLAIM ULTIMATUM

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 11.—At a meeting of the Canadian Merchant Service guild, a general strike of masters and mates serving on Canadian vessels was decided on, to be effective at once, unless the federal government appoints by Saturday a royal commission to investigate conditions. The strike will begin Monday night at 6, unless the demands of the guild are met.

## YANKEES FOUGHT HARD STRUGGLE IN BELLEAU WOOD

Editor's Note: The following is the second and concluding story by Lowell Mellett describing the battle of Belleau wood and the maneuvers preceding it. Yesterday's story concluded with the statement: "The night of the eighth they were told they were to attack in the morning."

WITH THE AMERICANS ON THE MARNE, June 25.—(By Mail, Passed by the Censor.)—They did so, moving down toward Lucy and advancing on Belleau wood.

Lucy is just west of the southern point of Belleau wood—now the Bois Des Americains—which extends about a mile and a half northward, nearly to the village of Belleau.

boches showed. Most of the enemy machine guns, however, were taken in bayonet rushes.

Reaching their designated objective, they found the battalion with which they were expected to connect on the right was not there. This apparently was due to a fault in the maps on which the advance was ordered.

To make the position safe it was necessary, after extending the line on the right to occupy the ground erroneously shown by the map to be in possession of other Americans, to attack again on the left.

More prisoners and machine guns were taken in this attack. The battalion was then ordered to withdraw on the left, leaving the ground to be taken care of by artillery. Next

morning, however, it was found that the Germans had infiltrated and were in the rear.

With this advantage the Germans attempted to attack but were held and the Germans in the rear were wiped out, seven machine guns being captured. While the fight was the liveliest, a company of engineers came to the Americans' aid and rendered splendid service. The Germans scarcely ceased shelling. They used high explosives, gas shells and one-pounders. The last named, termed "quick dick" by the Americans, came silently and exploded disastrously.

Airplanes dropping bombs from a low height contributed to the German fire.

Two days of this and the en-

gineers were withdrawn. Another battalion of the same brigade came to relieve the worn Americans. The newcomers were only two companies strong, having themselves been compelled to give up two companies because of gas and shelling. The tired original battalion remained with them two days longer, but at mid night of June 14, were ordered back, a regiment from another division coming to relieve them.

A German attack at 2 a. m. and another at 4 a. m. threatened to prevent relief being made, but both attacks were beaten off, and at 6 a. m. the battalion—what there was left of it—was on its way out of the woods.

The capture of these woods has been described, but if it is remem-

bered that they are filled with rocks, often the size of boulders, furnishing the Germans with natural nests for their machine guns, and if advantages offered by fields of wheat grown high and dense for machine gun emplacements are considered, some idea will be obtained of what is meant by "we drove the Germans out and took their guns."
