### REQUEST PROBE OF HUN PAPERS THRU AMERICA

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Disclosures showing use of huge sums of German money to influence and control the press of the United States have stirred up a demand in congress for a thoro probe of the whole foreign language press.

Fear that German money will be kept alive many papers printed in the German and Austrian languages is felt by members of congress. Several of them have evidence that German money did help keep some of these papers going for a while after America's entrance into the war.

This evidence has been in the hands of the justice department for some time. Senator King, of Utah, who several months ago, introduced a bill for suppression of the German and Austrian language press, today urged Senator Walsh, chairman of a subcommittee in charge of the bill, to call a meeting at once and report the measure to the senate.

"In the light of the disclosures with respect to the New York Mail," King said, "I think investigation should be made of the whole subject. The my bill applies particularly to the foreign-language press. It might be well to investigate Dr. Hunsley's actions at the same time. I am in favor of quick and drastic action to stamp out all agencies of enemy propaganda.


### RUMLEY WANTS TO TELL STORY

NEW YORK, July 12.—Seeking senate investigation into the acts which brought about his arrest by the federal government on a charge of perjury, Dr. Edward A. Rumley, former publisher of the New York Mail, today sent the following telegram to Senator King, of Utah:

"I see by the morning papers that you propose senate investigation, and are in doubt as to my position with regard to testifying. I waive immunities and will willingly place at your disposal all the facts in my possession."

It is alleged that Dr. Rumley bought the Evening Mail with money supplied by the German government, and committed perjury by making a false statement regarding the newspaper's ownership to the custodian of alien papers.

### French Railways Aid Tetuon Drive



The advantage possessed by the Germans on the West front in holding the "interior lines" is reinforced by an extraordinarily complete network of railways, shown on this map. This enables Von Hindenburg to move his troops most rapidly, threatening many points at the beginning of an offensive without disclosing the real direction in which he intends to strike. For instance, during the drive at Rheims and Soissons, the Germans concentrated at St. Quentin, where they were near the Amiens front than that on which they attacked. While the allies have to move around the salient to reinforce the front, the Germans, aided by these railways, move across it in much less time.

### Albert and Queen Aviate to France

HAVRE, France, July 12.—King Albert and Queen Elizabeth of Belgium arrived here today from England in a hydro-aeroplane. Previously they had flown to England to attend the silver wedding anniversary celebration of King George and Queen Mary.

Three fires near Lester, not far from the Sylvester fire area, were started by the electric storm of Tuesday, according to Stanton G. Smith, superintendent of the Snoqualmie forest reserve. A fire through the district, however, has been blotted out by the rain.

### PLAN POWDERED COAL FOR SEATTLE SCHOOLS

But George's trip to America was undertaken mainly with another object in view—to marry Lady Louise Nesta Pamela Wellesley.

She is the widow of his elder brother, Richard, killed at the first battle of Ypres.

British law does not permit a man to wed the widow of his brother. There is no such restriction in America. So the wedding was held in New York.

British law does not recognize such a marriage as legal. So Lord and Lady Wellesley expect to live in this country.

Lady Wellesley is a daughter of Sir Maurice Fitzgerald, Knight of Kerry.


