# ALLIES TO PUT GREECE ON FEET

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—Greece, hard hit by war, is to be put on her feet by the United States, England and France, it was learned today. Emergency relief to refugees and economic development are included in the programs of the allied nations interested. Blocking of German attempts to recover trade supremacy in this southernmost Balkan state after the war may result from this effort.

An American Red Cross mission sails shortly with food, clothing, medicine and a competent staff of medical and sanitary experts. It will give relief to 200,000 refugees, victims of Turkey and Bulgaria. Modern farming will be taught Greek peasants, who now follow primitive methods.

Meanwhile a Greek economic mission is in England arranging for extensive development of railroads, mineral resources and water power in Greece.

# WARREN CLEARS TWO SERGEANTS

Desk Sergeants Roy Olmstead and J. Warren, who expresses himself as firmly convinced of the honesty of the eight police officers on duty at the time the money disappeared.

# 12 BURIED IN BLAST DEBRIS

CINCINNATI, Sept. 14.—A dozen persons were believed to be buried in the ruins of a three-story brick building, wrecked by an explosion here today. One injured man has been taken out. The explosion is believed to have been due to gas. The building was occupied by a saloon and rooming house.

# Monks Make Good in Allied Armies

ROME, Sept. 14.—Out of a world-wide membership of 2,252, a total of 1,476 Capuchin monks are now serving in the allied armies in Italy, France, England and Belgium.

# HEINIES WEAR "MADE IN AMERICA" CLOTHES

PARIS, Sept. 14.—German prisoners rounded up by Americans are being fitted out with "hand-me-down" and cast-off uniforms of the Sammies. All of the torn and badly worn uniforms from the expedition are washed, fumigated and patched, then dyed green and turned over to the prisoners. On the blouse and in several places on the trousers the letters "P. W." meaning "prisoner of war," are stenciled.

# THREE SEATTLE MEN GIVEN PROMOTIONS

Three Seattle men have received promotions in the United States army service, in an order recently sent out by the war department. B. I. Robbins has been commissioned a second lieutenant in the quartermaster corps; L. B. Blake, moved up to captain in the medical division; and L. C. Ward has been appointed first lieutenant in the air service.

# MINERS URGE STRIKE; EIGHTY ARE ARRESTED

BUTTE, Sept. 14.—A bulletin circulated by "the miners' committee," calling for a strike, resulted in the arrest of 80.



# PERSHING TELLS OF BIG VICTORY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—In his report to the war department, Gen. Pershing announces the capture of 13,200 prisoners and a successful advance by Americans in clearing out the St. Mihiel salient. His statement follows:

"In the St. Mihiel sector, we have achieved further successes. The junction of our troops advancing from the south of the sector with those advancing from the West, has given us possession of the whole salient to points 12 miles northwest of St. Mihiel and has resulted in the capture of many prisoners.

"Forced back by our steady advance, the enemy is retiring and is destroying large quantities of material as he goes. The number of prisoners counted has risen to 13,200. Our line now includes Herbaville, Thillet, Hamonville, St. Benoit, Xammes, Jaulny, Thiocourt and Vieville."
