

### STORM WRECKS BEACHES NEAR LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 25.—South California was today gathering itself together after the hardest windstorm in 20 years. Heavy seas rolling in at the beaches brought plentiful evidence of a violent storm at sea. The yacht Trojan, carrying Chief Quartermaster Charles Kieruff, of the San Pedro navy training station, and a party of friends to Catalina, was missing, an all-night search by the U. S. patrol boat Ellington having failed to show any trace of the vessel. The yacht Dixie, carrying Charles Graham and Andrew Connor of Los Angeles, and R. Fowler of Pasadena, from Long Beach to San Diego, was driven ashore at Imperial Beach. It rode the breakers successfully and no one was injured. The orange crop suffered consid-

### Herrmann Silent About Taft Story

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 25.—"Anything that makes for the good of baseball I am for," was the only comment Garry Herrmann, president of the Reds, would make today on the report that Wm. H. Taft is being considered as successor to himself and Ban Johnson on the National commission. Herrmann was reported to be considerably perturbed by the wind, which reached a velocity of 38 miles an hour. Ripening oranges, heavy on the trees, were blown off in quantities.

### HAYS WEARY OF SCRAP IN SENATE RING

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Will H. Hays, chairman of the republican national committee, has washed his hands of the fight between old guard and progressives over Senator Penrose as chairman of the senate finance committee. After discussing the situation with both factions last week, Hays virtually announced that the fuss was none of his affair and that it was up to the two sets to get together before the present democratic congress goes out of existence March 3. "Old guard" leaders declared today that this will be accomplished. Progressives, including Borah and Kenyon, asserted, on the contrary, that there is a "little group" that will stick to the finish of any fight on Penrose, no matter whether it involves separation from the republican ranks. The mystery shrouding a letter written by Borah to Hays threatening to overturn republican control of the senate if Penrose was made finance chairman was cleared up today when it was learned that Borah, after writing the letter, did not mail it. Its contents were communicated to Hays, however, when he and Borah discussed the situation here last week.

### URGES JUSTICE FOR WOMEN WAR WORKERS

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Legislation or military regulations to safeguard the interests of girls and women who have been engaged in war work and who will be relieved of their duties or supplanted by returning soldiers, was advocated today by Mrs. Rosalie Loew Whitney. "Now that the soldiers are starting home from the front," said Mrs. Whitney, to the "New York Press," "the first effort that should be made in the demobilization of the army of women who have been doing war work is to insure their return, either to other work or to domestic life. "There should be no general throwing out of women from the work in which they have been engaged either in the munition or other factories or in the office work at the national capital and other centers. The same splendid military regulations governing the demobilization of the men in the army should govern the demobilization of the women army. "My opinion is that women who have gone into business, either for patriotic or economic reasons, will remain in industry of some kind. By this I do not mean that they, in retaining their position, exclude the men who have given up the positions for the service and who will return when peace is established."

### 28 More U-Boats Are Surrendered to Allies Sunday

HARWICK, Eng., Nov. 25.—Following the surrender of the major portion of the German grand fleet, 28 additional submarines, including the famous U-153, or Deutschland, that early in July, 1918, crossed to Baltimore from Bremen with a cargo of dynamite and mail, hauled down their flags and surrendered Sunday to representatives of the allied powers, including Sir Eric Geddes, first lord of the admiralty. Four giant subs of the cruiser type, typified in the Deutschland, were included in the surrender. One of these was nearly 350 feet in length.

### Three Thousand Gift Boxes Now On Way Overseas

Seattle parents and friends have already mailed more than 3,000 boxes of Christmas cheer to American soldiers in France, thru the Red Cross. Permits for more than 2,000 additional packages have been issued. Saturday, Nov. 23, is the last day packages will be accepted for mailing.

### Dutch Fishermen Hoot Wilhelm, Jr.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 25.—The ex-crown prince of Germany, as he arrived in the fishing town of Enkhuizen, on the Zuider Zee, Thursday, was hooted by the populace, which had not forgotten the attacks that had been made upon their fishing fleets by the U-boats. A cold reception is waiting for the exile in the little fishing village of Morderland, on the bleak island of Wieringen, where a small house has been leased to shelter him.

### Shop This Week Is Merchants' Appeal

### Northwest Firms to Handle 15 Vessels

The Pacific Steamship company and the firm of W. C. Dawson & Co., have been assigned as either manager, operator or agent of 15 vessels, recently built on the North Pacific by the U. S. shipping board. Dawson & Co. will act as agent for nine of the ships, the steel vessel Cascade, and eight wooden ships.

### Houseboats Leave Mooring in Storm

A high southwest wind, sweeping over Lake Washington, in the vicinity of Rainier Beach Saturday, wrecked and set adrift a number of houseboats. The same wind caused the roof of Engineers' hall, University of Washington, to cave in. Extensive damage from all sections of the lake is reported.

### Hindenburg Admits Defeat Is Complete

BERNE, Switzerland, Nov. 25.—The Berlin government has been informed by Hindenburg that it will be impossible for the German army to renew hostilities, says the semi-official Wolff agency.

### War Parents Will Be Given Memorial

Parents of soldiers and sailors of Washington, who have fallen in action, will be given a suitable memorial for the duty done by their sons by the Parents' Association of Soldiers and Sailors of Washington, according to Robert Saunders, president of the organization.

### WICKERSHAM SITS AT DINNER WITH SULZER

Charles Sulzer, delegate to congress from Alaska, sat at the same table with his opponent, James Wickersham, Saturday evening at the banquet given at the Arctic club, following the election of officers of the club. From latest reports from the North, Sulzer is leading for re-election to congress by six votes. J. H. Fox was elected president of the club for the coming year.

### CIVIL SERVICE TO HOLD 21 EXAMINATIONS SOON

The Seattle civil service commission will hold 21 examinations in December to fill vacancies and provide eligibles for new appointments. One of the places to be filled is the position of chief registration clerk, now held by W. A. Gaines. Examinations range from \$115 to \$270 a month.

### CHARGES FAIL IN ITALY CASE

BY HENRY WOOD (United Press Staff Correspondent) ROME, Nov. 25.—Former Premier Giolitti, accused of treason Saturday night by Deputy Marquis Centurione, was exonerated by a special investigating committee last night, which reported that the charges were without foundation. Another committee investigated the charges against Deputes Falcolli, Sciorati, DeGiovanni and Chirinaligo and Senators Pannarodi Cefaly, and Rfassati, who were accused jointly with Giolitti. All are socialists. The committee reported that the charges were groundless, and other socialist members demanded Centurione's resignation.

### 60 Per Cent of Dam Leakage Is Stopped

The city lighting plant will be developing 25,000 kilowatts instead of 13,000, as at present, when the sluicing operations for sealing of the floor of the Cedar river dam are completed, according to Councilman Erickson, who visited the dam Saturday. Sluicing operations last summer covered five acres, while the water at present is covering about 50 acres. The sealing work done so far has stopped 60 per cent of the leakage, according to Erickson.

### Ask People to Help Boost Camp Lewis

People of Washington, and all other Northwestern states, should use their influence to have the government maintain a permanent military cantonment at Camp Lewis. This is the appeal of Stephen Appleby, of Tacoma, who was instrumental in obtaining the purchase of the site by Pierce county, and its presentation to the government, on agreement that at least one division of troops be kept there permanently. He urges that more interest in developing Camp Lewis on a permanent basis be shown by civilians, and that they place the matter before their congressmen and senators.

### Cardinal Mercier Praises Americans

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Nov. 25.—"You have saved us and the world," Cardinal Mercier, of Belgium, is quoted as saying to an American Saturday, regarding America's participation in the war. He also spoke highly of President Wilson's messages which, in his opinion, completely foiled the Germans' dark plotting and treacherous diplomacy.

### Dies When Cable Catches Clothing

Funeral services for Stockton Rumsey, 40, winch driver, killed Sunday at the Great Northern dock by the catching of his clothes in a cable, while discharging cargo from the British vessel Katori Maru, will be held from 10 to 11 o'clock Tuesday at Rumsey's home, 601 Kinross place.

### BRIDES CAN PURCHASE PLENTY OF FURNITURE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Cheer up, brides and grooms. You can have that pretty furniture you long dreamed of. The war industries board today abandoned the conservation restrictions on manufacture of furniture which were to have gone into effect December 1.

### Alleged Evaders Are Held on Murder Charge

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., Nov. 25.—Jean Baptiste St. Germain and Victor Kram, alleged draft evaders and murderers, were taken here today by mounted police. The men, exhausted and hungry, were hiding in a straw stack. They are accused of the murder of James McKay and Corporal Charles Horsley.

### PATROL SERVICE TO END

Naval patrol service is to be discontinued soon, says Lieut. F. W. Becker, naval intelligence officer. Since the beginning of the war, incoming liners have been boarded at Port Townsend by a detachment of bluejackets, who remained on guard while the ship was in port.

### JUSSERAND GOES WITH WILSON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—French Ambassador Jusserand will accompany President Wilson to the peace conference, it was learned today.


