

### BIG PARADE TO HONOR BRITAIN

A naval and military parade, followed by a mass meeting of ball, will mark Seattle's part in the national celebration of Britain's Day, Saturday, December 7. On the Sunday following the churches will celebrate.

Gov. Ernest Lister is expected to take part in the parade, which is being arranged by a committee named by the King County Council of Defense and a citizens' committee. To further plans for the celebration, the following committeemen met at lunch in the Arctic club Tuesday noon: Fred Stimson, Frank Gates, J. S. Goldsmith, Judge Thomas Burke, J. E. Chibberg, L. Proctor, A. J. Rhodes, Joseph A. Swallow and C. R. Johnson.

The national celebration of Britain's Day is intended to display this country's regard for the nation with which she was associated in the fight against Germany, and as an expression of thanks for preserving the world from even greater horrors before the time America girded on the sword.

### CLARENCE GOOD TELLS STORY IN MURDER TRIAL

The hearing of the evidence against William Gottstein, the Seattle real estate man, charged with the murder of John Murray, a C. P. R. baggage man, in the woods near Des Moines, Oct. 4, was commenced in Judge Prater's court Tuesday morning.

The first witness for the prosecution was Clarence B. Good, a chauffeur, who testified that on Oct. 4 he was hired by Gottstein to drive him out near Des Moines, ostensibly to see some land, Gottstein, he said, went into the woods, saying that he would return in a few minutes. Witness heard a shot, and when the defendant returned he said that he was "only shooting at a squirrel."

On the way back to town Gottstein questioned him concerning "the best place to shoot a man."

**Returned Alone**  
Later in the day, Good stated, he drove the accused and John Murray to the same place. Both went into the woods and the witness drove on to Des Moines for lunch. When he returned, Gottstein was waiting for him alone, and told him that Murray had taken the stage back to town.

Good said that when he heard afterwards that Murray was missing, he reported the affair to the authorities.

**All Day to Pick Jury**  
All Monday was occupied in the work of selecting a jury. It was Walter B. Allen, who is defending Gottstein, closely questioned every juror as to whether he had read the newspaper accounts of the alleged murder and formed any opinion concerning the guilt of the accused. He took full advantage of his right to six peremptory challenges, while Prosecuting Attorney Alfred H. Lundin challenged one of the jurors.

It was late Monday afternoon before the following six men and six women were sworn in to try the case:

Mary Sanden, wife of the manager of the Hotel Barker; C. G. Ellis, carpenter; Eva J. Loughhead, wife of a shipyard worker; Arne Reichstad, foreman in a sash and door factory; James B. Babbit, retired carpenter; O. E. Rosenberry, manager of a typewriter service company; Florence R. Case, wife of a motorman; Elizabeth Jenkins, wife of a plumber; Frances J. Maxfield, wife of an employe in the city comptroller's office; Harriet A. McManus, widow; Oscar Huffman, farmer; Hans Donnergard, retired.

### ENDS OWN LIFE WHILE FLEEING FROM POLICE

The body of R. N. Harris, of Havre, Mont., is in the county morgue Tuesday, following suicide on the streets of Seattle Monday night, when Harris fired a bullet thru his head while pursued by the police.

According to the story of Sgt. William Donlan and Patrolman E. W. Pielow, they encountered Harris in the vicinity of 17th ave. N. and E. Republican st. Questioned as to his actions, Harris, the officers say, drew a revolver first, twice at Sgt. Donlan, missed, and ran, firing one shot at Patrolman Pielow as the latter rushed after him. A fourth shot was heard, and Harris fell to the pavement, dying before the arrival of the police ambulance.

Examination of Harris' revolver at the police station showed four discharged shells, while the revolvers of the policemen had not been fired.

### 17 DAYS BEFORE MOONEY DEATH PENALTY IS DUE

These base their belief upon the theory that Stephens will be unwilling to assume even partial responsibility for the turmoil into which the hanging of Mooney would throw American labor.

**May Stand Pat**  
Others, who declare Gov. Stephens has expressed himself unalterably against a pardon, believe he will "stand pat" and let Mooney hang. Among these there is a small element who believe President Wilson, in the emergency, would step in, taking advantage of the war emergency to save Mooney, as commander-in-chief of the army.

From all parts of the country came telegrams today from labor councils and unions stating that general strikes would begin December 9, or earlier, as a protest against the execution of Mooney.

These telegrams gave visible testimony that labor will make Mooney a national issue. In striking contrast to this was the action of the San Francisco Labor council which Friday night voted against a Mooney strike.

The council's action, however, did not bind the machinists' union, which voted to strike December 9, and telegraphed the president, asking him to intercede once more for Mooney.

Mooney will hang unless Gov. Stephens acts, or—and this is considered a "long chance"—unless President Wilson steps in as commander-in-chief of the army and takes the case out of the hands of the state authorities.

**Spokane Labor Asks Stephens to Free Mooney**  
SPOKANE, Nov. 26.—The Central Labor council last night voted to turn the question of a sympathetic strike December 9, to protest against hanging Tom Mooney, back to the various locals for decision. A resolution asking Gov. Stephens of California to free Mooney was indorsed.
