but added, "Every I. W. W. in America is spreading Bolshevik ideas."

The statement was made to the committee in a memorandum submitted thru the office of Solicitor Lamar of the postoffice department and prepared by James D. Horton. This memorandum declared the I. W. W.'s are the most active of the radicals seeking to replace the American government with a Bolshevik republic.

**Plan World System**

Committee members today declared they feel the investigation has clearly shown that the Russian Bolshevik mean, if they can, to extend their systems to all the world, even to the extent of helping revolutionists with force, if necessary. They declared legislation must be enacted that will:

- 1—Keep agitators out of the country.
- 2—Curb and punish those trying to undermine the government.
- 3—Keep teaching of Bolshevism out of the mails and public prints.

Senator Overman, committee chairman, indicated no more witnesses will be called now unless some good reason is shown.

## TAFT WARNING IS ISSUED TO G. O. P. CHIEFS

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Republican supporters of the league of nations, headed by former President Taft, are warning G. O. P. opponents of the Wilson covenant against a too rigid stand, lest they endanger the party.

It is now generally admitted that when the peace treaty comes back from France, the league of nations will be part and parcel of it. The whole of the drafting of the treaty in Paris has been built on the promise of a league of nations, and practically every article in some way is applicable under league rules.

Hence, if the treaty, when completed, failed of ratification in a republican senate because the league of nations was a part of it, the whole work of drafting the treaty would have to be done over again—and in the meantime the treaty would remain ineffective and a state of war would continue as now.

**Would Prolong War**

The party responsible for holding up ratification of the treaty would undoubtedly be charged by the opposing party with having prolonged the war.

Taft's move and the differences of opinion in both parties have created the belief that there is a possibility, in 1920, if the peace treaty is not ratified, of the electorate splitting up into a new alignment—those for and those opposed to ratification of the league. The fight would then be with the issue of moderate internationalism as opposed to a strict nationalism.

In this connection there are now strong organizations backing both elements, favoring and opposing the league, each organization determined to carry the fight to the finish.

Owing to the fact, however, that the leading republicans opposing the Wilson covenant favor some league, the hope is expressed by friends in both the republican and democratic parties that Wilson will recommend clarification of questioned articles, so as to remove much of the opposition and assure the league's ratification.

## Director Hines and Railway Men Talking Finances

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Director General Hines of the railway administration, is working with railroad officials to the end of adjusting the financial troubles of the roads resulting from the failure of congress to pass a \$750,000,000 appropriation.

Twenty-five men, a majority of the railroad officials and including representatives of the war finance corporation and the financial advisory board of the roads, went into conference with Hines at 10 a. m.

The meeting was behind closed doors.

their government, afterward coming back to Versailles for the formal signing.

The Count Bernstorff will not be a member of the German delegation appeared certain today, as the allies have taken action to make clear that he will not be welcome.

The move of the supreme war council in crushing conscription in Germany was accepted as probably meaning the death blow to that system thruout the world. Under present conditions in other European countries it was believed this was the only interpretation which could be applied to the council's action.

Altho other nations, such as France and Italy, may retain conscription for the present, it appeared likely that the future will bring general changes. The difficulty attending the conscription question in Great Britain was made obvious by the trouble encountered by Lloyd George since extension of the war conscription law. France at present has a three-year conscription service term, but with the German menace removed and no big potential army threatening or likely to be able to threaten her, the action of the war council was expected to influence her, as well as other countries, on the principle that compulsory military service, never being welcome, would be even less attractive with no incentive.

Such a development, it is accepted, will permit rapid scaling down of armies under the league of nations plan and will mean a long step toward international disarmament.

**Discuss League in London Meet**

LONDON, March 11.—Recommendations for amendment of the World Constitution were considered today by the convention of various league of nations societies representing ten countries.

In the morning session, numerous proposals by British, French, Italian and American delegates were taken up secretly.

The most important of these were connected with the guarantees demanded by the French and the matter of armaments.

The Americans are interested in both propositions, especially the latter, which includes fixing the size of international forces.

It was expected there would also be some discussions of world-wide abolition of conscription. The delegates, included Fridtjof Nansen, the Norwegian explorer and statesman, who was especially invited.

The Americans were Arthur Kuhn, Oscar Strause, Hamilton Holt and Miss Fanny F. Andrews.

The press was admitted to the afternoon session.

## TO DECIDE ON CABLE SEIZURE

PARIS, March 11.—Creation of a commission of lawyers to determine the status of cables seized during the war was expected today to open the whole question of international law affecting cables.

American dissent to the naval terms of the preliminary treaty, which provided merely that the German cables should not be returned, leaving ultimate ownership undecided, is believed to have resulted in appointment of the commission, of which James Brown Scott is the American member.

American interests are directly affected, inasmuch as the two most important of these cables are those which formerly connected New York and Bremen by way of the Azores.

The Azores are Portuguese territory, and interference with the cables involved American rights. Two neutrals were affected, since the United States was not then a belligerent. Since, aside from the one French line to New York, the Bremen system, which has excellent and up-to-date equipment, is the only direct connection between America and the continent, there is no disposition to permit Great Britain and France to acquire title to the cables seized during the war.

Another cable, between West Africa and Brazil, which also was seized, will come under the findings of the lawyers' commission.

## Secy. Baker Denies Airplane Junk Plan

CHICAGO, March 11.—Secretary Baker denies knowledge of any plan to sell airplanes as junk. He was in Chicago last night with Chief of Staff March on a tour of army camps.

"I have heard of that story," said Baker. "I know nothing about it. Gen. Mencher, in charge of the air division, has made no recommendations to me."

## Dusseldorf Now in Hun Trouble

ZURICH, March 11.—The Wolff bureau, semi-official German news agency, announces today that the strike in Dusseldorf has again been proclaimed in Dusseldorf and Silesia.

## Congressmen to Accompany Baker on Trip Abroad

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Members of the house military affairs committee have been invited to go abroad with Secretary Baker. It was learned from committee members today.

The trip of the congressmen would be of an unofficial nature. It was explained, and they probably will not stay with the secretary after they reach the other side.

So far seven democrats have accepted the invitation. They are: Chairman Dent, Alabama; Representatives Shields, Olney, Hull, Anthony, Harrison and Nicholls.

## MONDELL NAMED IRISH DENOUNCE AS FLOOR LEADER

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Representative Frank W. Mondell of Newcastle, Wyo., today was elected republican floor leader in the next congress. The vote for Mondell was 169 to 23, the latter number merely voting "present."

Fifty-three votes were absent from the meeting of the republican committee on committees.

Previous to the nomination of Mondell, Representative Mann, Illinois, present floor leader, was chosen again to lead the republican forces in the house, but declined the nomination. The vote for Mann was 154, 12 voting against him and two voting for Representative Longworth.

## TITLED VISITOR

BOSTON, March 11.—Sir Horace Plunkett, Irish statesman on a visit to the United States, was denounced as an agent of the British government by Irish leaders here today.

"Sir Horace Plunkett should come out in his true colors, namely as an agent of the British government," Matthew Cummings, former head of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, declared. "His mission here is English propaganda, pure and simple. The few nice things he has said regarding Ireland have been camouflage."

Plunkett's addresses here brought forth a storm of protest, particularly from the Sinn Fein societies and the "Friends of Irish Freedom." He opposed separation of Ireland from England.

## WANT JAIL NEAR TO MUNICIPAL BUILDING

The proposed county-city jail will be built near the city-county building at Third ave. and James st., if Monday's session of the sheriff, county commissioners and the city councilmen is any criterion.

The need for a new jail was openly expressed, and it was also agreed that the county and city should keep their prisoners separated. No action was taken.
