Seattle's city officials will turn over \$15,000,000 in utility bonds to traction heads before night Saturday, in exchange for the Stone-Webster street car system.


CONFERENCE ON WAGES ENDED

FATE WILL BE KNOWN TONIGHT

Defense Says a Chinaman May Have Killed John Murray Oct. 4

ALSO FLAYS GREENBAUM
The fate of William Gottstein, on trial the second time, charged with the murder of John Murray, near Des Moines, October 4, was scheduled to be in the hands of the jury late Saturday. Gottstein will know within a few hours if he must serve a life sentence in Walla Walla, or regain his freedom.

Points to Chinese
An unidentified Chinese, who was seen by Ames C. Rink prowling around the road near where the body was found, may have killed John Murray, the defense contended.

Shot by Coward
Without calling Gottstein to the witness stand, the defense closed its case Friday afternoon. Deputy Prosecutor Carmody took the jury through the evidence, described the incidents that led up to Gottstein's arrest, and declared Clarence Good, driver of the auto which took Gottstein to the spot near where John Murray's body was found, told the truth.

BELIEVE CRAB CAUSED DEATH
Herbert Madden, 29, a chauffeur in the employ of E. L. Cronkall, 610 36th ave. N., was found dead in bed about 8:30 a. m. Saturday, by his employers. Ptomaine poisoning is thought to have caused his death.

Gompers plans to sail from France about April 2.

ARMIES IN HUNGARY TANGLED

Chaos Seems Near as Soldiers Race to Lines in New Zone of Trouble

MUDDLE IS INCREASING
LONDON, March 29.—A news agency dispatch from Berlin today, said the Lokai Anzeiger understands suspension of the armistice is possible.

ZURICH, March 29.—Bolshevik forces have reached the outskirts of Odesa, according to an official wireless received from Moscow today.

LONDON, March 29.—The most gigantic military struggle in the history of the world apparently is being staged in and around Hungary. Dispatches from various sources showed armies of mixed and mixed nationalities commencing this way and that, seemingly rushing, but just as the quickly passing each other by. Conflicting reports today indicate the following situation:

Both railway lines between Budapest and Vienna have been cut by allied forces. Italians occupying Prague and Czech-Slovaks holding Raab on the southern route. Russian Bolsheviks are sweeping westward and across Eastern Galicia, overrunning the rich oil lands and threatening invasion of Austria. Rumanians on March 29. A Rumanian army is entering Galicia along the same route as traveled by the Russian Bolsheviks. Another Rumanian army is marching toward Budapest, across the Maros river.

RUMANIA ROUTS BOLSHIEV ARMY
Inflict Crushing Defeat in Battle on Dneister River
BERNE, March 29.—Rumanian troops inflicted a crushing defeat on Bolshevik forces along the left bank of the Dneister, near Javilaska (Bessarabia), it was announced today in an official dispatch from Bucharest. Near Tiraspol (60 miles northwest of Odessa), the Rumanians have established contact with the French.

5,000 "REDS" ARE CAPTURED
LONDON, March 29.—Admiral Kolchak's army continues to defeat the Bolsheviks, according to official advices received from Omsk today. Between March 14 and 18, the anti-Bolsheviks advanced 50 miles and took 5,000 prisoners on the Ural front. Ufa was taken March 18.

30,000 MEN TO STAY AT LEWIS

Army Fains 91st as a Permanent Division
The Northwest is assured a permanent army division at Camp Lewis, according to an announcement by Chief of Staff James H. Washington today, following the reorganization of American military forces, on a basis of 100,000 men. The Camp Lewis division will retain the famous name of the 91st, but will be composed of new troops.
