## Local Sportsmen Invade Wilderness to Battle With Finny Tribe Today

Armed with rods and reels, a horde of Seattle sportsmen is scheduled to make its first invasion of the wilderness today, the opening day of the fishing season, to battle with the finny tribe.

More than 2,000 fishermen have taken out licenses in King county this spring, and the trains and roads to the fishing haunts are expected to be flooded with fishing "bugs" today.

While conditions, a week ago indicated lake fishing, because of the high waters in the streams, the rivers have receded and fishing in the streams is expected to be exceptionally good for so early in the season.

**Lakes Popular**  
Many sportsmen, however, are expected to invade the multitude of small lakes that abound in King county.

The fact that the first fish stories of the year will be invented today, and that it is All Fools' day, is rather significant, but mothers and small sons and daughters undoubtedly will believe, dad and older brother and hubby when they come home with their tales of the big ones they almost landed.

In an effort to help those planning trips at the end of the week, the following stream bulletin is published:

**Clallam County**—All streams are low and clear.  
**Lake Cushman, near Hoodport**—Water is clear. Indications point to very good fishing on April 1. All rivers in this vicinity medium high and clear.

**Lake Kitsap, near Charleston**—With continued fair weather, this lake should be fine for the opening of the season.

**Skykomish River**—At Skykomish and Index is reported low and the water fairly clear. All streams are low and clear.

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## BEES' PILOT OUTLINES HIS BALL PLANS

SALT LAKE CITY, April 1.—Eddie Herr, manager of the Salt Lake Bees, outlined his plan of campaign at Pittsburgh, Col., the other day.

The redoubtable Adolph Schindler is depended upon to toss a few victories his club's way. One more pitcher, yet to be secured, and the announcement of whose name will occasion a circle of excitement in Coast league circles, will round out the Bee pitching crew.

Herr intends to stick within the 15-man limit, and believes that he can get by with that number, if any one else can.

ONE week from today the Coast league starting gong will tap its merry melody in the South, where the clubs will play the first game of the season. The year promises to be the biggest baseball season in the history of the sport in the Coast circuit.

With the addition of Seattle and Portland to league membership the circuit has been strengthened and permits the clubs to swing North, where they can play two series of games. Without the other city, neither Portland nor Seattle would be able to maintain a Coast league club because of the transportation problem.

But with both clubs in the league the prospects for the coming year look rosy.

Seattle opens in the San Francisco Seals' back yard on April 8. They will show their wares for the first time to Seattle fans on April 23.

It is up to Seattle fans to step out to the ball yard and support the Seattle team this season. Local business men who are interested in the game for the game's sake have given up their time and a huge bagful of coin in an effort to put the game back on its feet here. It is now practically a municipal institution, operated for the good of the community.

**Will Have Good Club**  
Seattle will have a good club, according to the advance dope. The local magnates hooked one of the best managers in minor league baseball in the country when they snared Bill Clymer to pilot the local club. Clymer has brought a host of players to the West from the Eastern leagues who look mighty sweet on paper.

The addition of Jack Knight to the Seattle forces adds a strong hitter to the infield. Fielding ability is essential, but an ordinary fielding first sacker can get by if he can whale the pill. First baseman is expected to be one of the best of the stickers on the roster. Knight is not only a good hitter, but he can field, according to reports from the East. The rest of the infield looks permanent at the present time, with Niehoff at second, Murphy at third and Fabrique at shortstop. This inner works will compare with the best of the infields in the league.

Two more battery men will just about make the Seattle club. A steady pitcher, who can be depended upon to win the majority of his games, and a first-class catcher, are still wanted by the Seattle pilot, who says he will go out and get them, if possible.

Walter Mills, the oratorical left-hander, is making a nice impression in the South. He has all the stuff in the world, and should make good. And then there is Bowman, Falkenberg, Eastley and Mains, who all look like winners.

The young Stratton, who is making a bid for the first base job, continues to sting the ball hard in practice, but it hardly looks as if he will be able to linger with the Sox this season, because he lacks experience and, in the Coast circuit, the managers can't waste much time with youngsters just breaking in.
