Here are some of the problems now facing the Japanese government: 1.—The independence of Korea. 2.—The League of Nations, which Japan will not join as long as it prevents Japanese from emigrating to America. 3.—The question of control in China. 4.—The Russian intervention problem. 5.—The disposition of the German colony of Kiau Chau. 6.—The recent fight between Japanese and American troops at Tientsin.

Dan, who is willing to face the Germans, or any one else, immediately severed diplomatic relations. But Dan stood his ground and the long arm of the law reached out and plucked him. Monday afternoon, in Judge Gordon's court, Dan told the circumstances of his incarceration. "Honorably discharged," quoth the judge.

H. J. WILSON EXPLAINS PLANS FOR CARNIVAL

"The soldiers and sailors are getting an absolutely square deal in the benefit carnival scheduled for April 10 to 20," declared H. J. Wilson, recording secretary of the soldiers' and sailors' council, Tuesday. "and Frank W. Gates, who made the kick about a bunko game, has nothing to do with the council." Wilson declared that the soldiers and sailors will receive 25 per cent of the gross receipts and 50 per cent of all concessions at the carnival.
