

Racing for the World Market

Chairman Committee Sent to Europe by President Wilson to Study Labor Situation

Are high wages, short hours and organized labor handicaps in the race for international markets? Most employers think they are. Our competitors buy cheaper labor in the first argumentative bombproof of retreat. Laboring European employers. But the dugout has a tin roof and is demolished by the first shell full of facts that hits it.

If labor lives decently industry must die nationally is the logical conclusion of those who plead for low pay. It is labor's greed that is mauling the goose with the golden product is the charge against those whose foolish selfishness is supposed to be destroying their own jobs.

This problem is critical at this instant. Nations are standing at the mad race for markets. If raising wages, reducing hours and increasing taxes for education, housing and social welfare will handicap our industrial entry then we must wait until other nations catch up with our labor standards before making further advances.

This line of argument sounds too plausible to be true. It sounds just like common sense, and every accurate scientific observer knows that common sense and ordinary observation are almost always wrong. Common sense is more reliable than common sense. On the authority of Gilbert & Sullivan, "Things are seldom what they seem."

The world is not flat. The sun does not revolve around us. Space is not empty. The hills are not eternal. Most stars are larger than the earth. Because common sense proved the reverse of all these statements knowledge blundered and human progress was delayed for centuries.

If we look closer and use the instruments of accurate investigation it is plain that cheap labor will never rule the world market. Those markets now, and in all times past, are barred to hunger-weakened, overworked, ignorant populations and at the mercy of the best fed, housed, taught and amused workers.

More than half the human race lives in China, India and Russia. There, too, are the richest natural resources, the lowest wages, the longest hours, the most subservient workers. Yet with all the rest of the world crushed with war, no one feared that the war exempt among these nations would seize international markets. The industrial yellow peril will not put flesh upon its ghost until wages, hours, education and organization of labor in Asia approach western standards.

The race of nations in the race for markets is directly proportioned to the standard of living of their laborers. It is Great Britain that threatens to out-compete the world, because she is preparing to pay higher wages, work shorter hours, build better houses and schools and provide means to use the minds of her workers in the management of industry. Unless American capitalists develop sufficient intelligence to grant similar conditions, or unless American workers develop sufficient strength to compel this higher standard, this nation will be driven from the markets of the world.

Low wages at home are as effective in restricting markets as high tariffs abroad. Cheap labor means expensive production.

These are lessons the facts have taught, whatever deceptive appearances common sense may seem to have presented.

MAN SLEEPS THREE MONTHS AND NOT AWAKE YET, SAYS DOCTOR

Dr. Beverly A. Tucker was first to discover "sleeping sickness" in America. He has given the disease a name, the disease to N. E. A. Because of his early study of the disease he has been made chairman of a committee of the Virginia state board of health to seek the cause and cure.

The "sleeping sickness" which is now epidemic in various parts of this country, is not the sleeping sickness caused by the bite of a fly which is common in Africa. It is known to physicians as "cephalitis lethargica," and to give it a popular name I have called it "epidemic somnolence." It was known in the 17th and 18th centuries, and in 1895 was reported in all countries of Europe and one or two places in the United States.

It was not heard of here again until eight cases were reported from Camp Lee, Va., a few weeks ago, when the fact struck me that I should notice cases of extreme sleepiness, accompanied by high temperatures, in my own practice and consultations. I recognized that it was an unknown disease and had spoken to my friends about it.

I reported the cases to the state board of health, of which I am a member, and because I was the first to report them I was made chairman of a committee to investigate the disease. Soon six more cases were reported, making a total of 13, four of which are in Richmond and the rest in other parts of Virginia and North Carolina. Then came the reports of several cases in Chicago.

THREE MONTHS IS LONGEST SLEEP

The periods of somnolence vary. In our shortest case the patient slept for three days, and in the longest case he has been sleeping for three months, and is still asleep.

The condition is, in reality, not sleep, but a puzzling sort of coma. The patient can be aroused as you would waken some one from sleep. The bowels function normally. The patient remains absolutely quiet in position; when awakened he secures a blank expression, takes little interest in anything, and says little.

Some patients take food naturally, others have to be forcibly fed with liquids. I have one patient who is aroused regularly three times a day, sits up in bed and eats, and relapses into unconsciousness.

There is no pain, except some headache and nausea. The temperature does not exceed 102.2. Pulse is not affected.

There is no toxic condition, as in other cases, which produces unconsciousness. Respiration is normal. There are no symptoms of any nature, except an increased rigidity of the muscles and a partial paralysis of the face and head. I have found no evidences of infantile paralysis. There is no coughing or sneezing.

I have examined the spinal fluid in all cases and have found that it has been under increased pressure. This and the fact that the cranial nerves are affected have led me to believe that the disease is caused by an affection of the base of the brain. Whether it is caused by a germ we do not know yet. Our present laboratory findings, taken from examinations of the blood and the spinal fluid, have shown no germ. I have made X-ray examinations of the head, which also showed nothing.

None of our thirteen cases has communicated the disease to any other person. I believe, however, that the disease can be communicated by direct contact thru the nose and mouth. I do not consider it contagious.

various parts of the country, where the influenza epidemic was most serious. I regard the "epidemic of somnolence" as a recrudescence of the influenza epidemic. I do not regard it as a fatal disease, because the patient takes nourishment and his body continues to function.

We have had no deaths, although I understand there was one fatal case in Chicago, and I have heard of one fatal case in South America. But it is an extremely inconvenient and obnoxious disease, and it may disable the patient for months. It comes on gradually, and leaves just as gradually.
