HELMET TWICE HIT BY BULLETS
 Seattle "War Daddy" Had Narrow Escape

Seattle's list of "war daddies" was increased by one, and a very distinguished one, at that, when Capt. Eugene S. Cohn, of Co. G, of the 364th infantry, 91st division, arrived in Seattle last week.

Capt. Cohn came back with three wound stripes and a distinguished service cross to find that his wife, formerly Miss Martha Rhodes, daughter of A. J. Rhodes, local manager of Bradner & Co., and a popular university girl, had presented him with a bouncing 19-pound baby boy.

Capt. Cohn enlisted in the first officer's training camp at the Presidio, and left for France with the 91st division in July of 1918.

The captain's helmet was pierced by two bullets.

The particular act for which Capt. Cohn was decorated was for remaining on active duty for 54 hours after being severely wounded.

When Capt. Cohn's regiment reached New York two weeks ago, he got a special leave of absence to come to Seattle and see the new addition to his family, and until that leave is up, will be at the family home at Lake Forest Park.

DEMONSTRATION IS ALL PLANNED

But More Money Is Needed to Show Seattle's Spirit

It won't be long now. They're in the homeland and just as eager to get back to their wild and woolly West as the folks at home are to have them. Who?

Why, the biggest bunch of Seattle men—the toughest crew from the toughest division Uncle Sam put across—the boys of the 361st infantry, 91st division.

According to Frank Gates, Jr., chairman of the welcome committee, they should be in the city now within the next 10 days. The committee doesn't expect notification of the plans for moving the regiment across the continent until they are actually entrained and on their way.

"If all our preliminary plans are made," he says, "this will give us plenty of time to fix dates and put the finishing touches to the big celebration in their honor."

And the demonstration is going to be a whopper! Music of bands, airplanes, flowers, and decorations galore! These things the committee assure, together with a big feed and entertainment for the boys. The cheering multitude will be there, all right; they are certain.

Meet Friday Night

To put their plans in such shape and discuss the important question of raising more funds, the general welcome committee will meet in room 409, County-City building, Friday night at 8 o'clock. They will hear the proposals of the executive committee and pass upon them.

More funds are still needed. It will take between \$3,000 and \$4,000 to show the boys a really good time and make them know that their sacrifices and hardships abroad are appreciated at home.

Word has just been received, too, that several hundred sailors of the U. S. navy will reach this city in a few days. Most of them are boys who have seen active duty chasing the Hun sub in the Atlantic war zones, and they are the first of the nation's defenders on the sea who have reached here with their craft since the armistice signing.

The committee at its meeting Friday will also plan to welcome these men.

Due Tuesday

Ships bringing the sailors are the old Oregon, due at Bremerton next Tuesday; seven sub chasers and their crews left San Diego Wednesday for the Puget Sound navy yard. These boats have been on patrol duty off the Azores islands.

An effort will be made by the Seattle welcome committee to secure permission from Commander Capt. Harry A. Field of the navy yard to have the boys come to Seattle on the craft on which they served.

This will be the first large group of navy men the city has had the opportunity of honoring upon their return.
