## YANK GAVE LIFE TO SAVE FRIEND

### Trapped in Tank, Pushes Pal Out to Safety

THIS IS ONE OF THE TEN BEST HERO STORIES OF THE WAR, PICKED BY PERSHING.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—"Great or love bath no man than this; that he lay down his life for his friend."

Here is one of the most beautiful stories of the war. The classic sentiment of Damon and Pythias is outdone by modern fact in a shell-hole in France.

Harold W. Roberts of San Francisco, was a corporal in Co. A, 84th battalion of the Tank corps.

He was assigned to drive a "whippet" tank during the battle in Montebreu woods, October 4. Just ahead of Roberts' tank another "whippet" had become disabled and put out of action.

The ground was difficult and full of shell-holes, but Roberts thought he could maneuver into position in a clump of bushes where he could afford protection to the disabled tank.

Suddenly his machine gave a great lurch, and slid head down into a shell-hole ten feet deep. It was filled with water, which had deceived the driver as to its depth.

Roberts' tank was completely submerged. Water began pouring in through the gun-ports, and in a few seconds the floor of the machine was under two or three feet of water.

Quick as a flash the two men in the tank realized that one of them was facing death. If they opened the little door in the back of the tank, one of them could escape. But the water would rush in as he did so, and the man who remained was doomed!

It was a situation to test men's souls to the utmost. Which of those two brave American soldiers was to make the supreme sacrifice—to lay down his life for his friend? They had only a second or two to decide.

The gunner stood stupefied. "Well, only one of us can get out," said Driver Roberts. His voice was calm and firm as he delivered his own death sentence.

"Out you go!" he continued. As he spoke he opened the door of the tank and pushed his companion out. They found his body in the tank when they pulled it from the shell-hole after the battle.

Such is the stuff of which heroes are made.

Corporal Roberts' uncle, Paul W. Liefert of San Francisco, will receive a Congressional Medal of Honor as the nation's token of gratitude for his nephew's act.

Fighting is over, but paying for the war isn't, hence the Fifth Liberty (VICTORY) Loan.

## WOULD IMPROVE PACIFIC YARDS

### Navy Committee Announced Big Sum Is Planned

WASHINGTON, April 17.—(United Press.)—Large funds for increased naval preparedness in the Pacific will be carried in the next naval appropriations bill to be reported soon after the convening of the extra session of congress.

Members of the house naval committee who have just returned from a tour of the Pacific, today said they were in accord with Daniels' proposals and declared that more money to develop shore facilities will be necessary to carry out the policy.

 The place was ransacked of as much liquor as two cars would hold and the booze taken to the home of Mangin and stored in the cellar until the following night, it is charged. The liquor was then removed, all but Mangin's share.

Sunday night Patton, it is alleged, went back to the warehouse to see if the robbery had been discovered and, finding that nothing had yet been found, notified the others, and a second haul was made.

Sunday night Hagen, it is said, met Fred Smart and invited Smart to share in the second affair. Smart acquiesced, and he then helped Ed Carey, the jitney driver, to load his machine, officials say. The liquor was then taken home and hidden under the front porch of Carey's home at 1100 27th ave. N. It is charged.

The liquor was listed and a description of it was in the hands of the police and federal authorities, and it is believed that the raiders intended to let the affair blow over before disposing of any of the booze.
