RUSSIAN WOMEN WORK; MEN TALK

Heads of Families Loaf and Decide Politics

"It is the Russian woman who is the real economic force in Russia today. She does all the work, while the men loaf around and talk politics. The Russian woman is underfed and overworked, but has an insatiable desire for education."

This is the charge made by Miss Elizabeth Boies, Y. W. C. A. worker, of New York, who, after spending two years in the interior and Siberian parts of Russia, is in Seattle recruiting Y. W. C. A. members for immediate duty in Japan.

Boisheviki Spoil Plans Miss Boies first went to Russia, just after the first revolution, at the summons of prominent Russian women, who realized the need for social service among the girls of Russia.

Before she arrived came the fall of the Kerensky regime, and conditions in Russia forestalling her original plans, she set about doing Y. W. C. A. work. She worked in Petrograd and Moscow until last August, when she was forced to leave with the other Americans.

Half Factories Closed "About half the factories at Moscow were operating only half time last summer, because it was harvesting season and the people went to the country to look after their crops.

"Owning land, however small the tract, has become a passion with the Russian people."

Miss Boies says sugar sold at \$8 a pound and dairy products were almost unobtainable at any price. The overworked, underfed condition of the people had made them susceptible to disease and they are dying by thousands, she says.

Women Work; Men Talk "The work the Russian women do is almost unbelievable. I have seen them go into the fields early in the morning and work continuously until evening, when they would go home and get their own supper. They are doing manual work on the railroads, repairing roads and building bridges.

The men are the ones who loaf around at home and make a pretense of transacting their land business in town. Upon leaving the interior, Miss Boies went up to Archangel, where, with five other Y. W. C. A. workers she conducted a hostess house for the American soldiers stationed at the Russian port.

Yanks Like Dancing "Our hostess house was merely a log hut unadorned except for some wall paper and a rocking chair, which was always occupied by a sleeping Yank. The girls at the hut were the only American girls in that bleak northern country and we were kept busy entertaining. I have never danced so much in my life before as during my stay at Archangel."

Miss Boies says there is a lure about Russia which will some day take her back to the big country of the North. She leaves for San Francisco Thursday.

Sergeant Looker says he will not go mad over the bite, but his disposition toward Orientals is soured a trifle and he regards all dogs with aversion.
